STATE BOARD OF HEALTH ADVISES

(Continued from page One) which can be prevented by immunization.

It may be freely granted that the inoculation of individuals in order to render them immune to one disease or another is not an ideal procedure.

Health officials wish as much as anyone else that there were some simple general measures which would make the procedure unnecessary.

For many years, in fact, they have been attempting control by such means as quarantine, isolation and disinfection to check spread of communicable disease.

Their efforts have met with some measure of success in the case of certain diseases. For example, as has been indicated, it has been possible to reduce typhoid fever to the disappearing point by the sanitary control of water and milk supplies.

On the other hand smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, and a number of other common infections have never shown any amenability to control by any means other than by actual immunization of each susceptible individual.

We are fortunate in being able to state that there is really no need for anyone nowadays ever to have either smallpox or diphtheria, and these diseases have been in the past among the most deadly scourges.

Vaccination protects against smallpox and toxoid against diphtheria. Information has been given that the charge for vaccination has been reduced to fifty cents for the purpose of allowing all to take advantage of helping to prevent the further spread of the epidemic.

This was brought about by the request of the city council and with the aid of City Health Officer Dr. A. W. Christopherson.
