THEATRE NOTES

"Keeping the spirit of romance alive is the way Charles Farrell, popular star of Fox movie tone pictures, answers the question of what his newest vehicle, "The Princess and the Plumber," is all about. "In the good old days," Farrell says, "to judge from the old books, the knights spent all their spare time in dashing about the country side rescuing imprisoned damsels from perilous places. And regardless of modern cynicism, most people still entertain a secret liking for that sort of thing, a liking that is amply demonstrated by the wide sale of romantic books and magazines. "In "The Princess and the Plumber," we have a princess and a castle and all those trimmings, but completely up-to-date, since I met her in a car and we leave in an airplane. But the essential part of the story, the romance itself, is practically unchanged; with no great alteration, if might have been laid in the fourteenth century instead of the twentieth, although in that case I'd have to be an arquebuser or something instead of an engineer."

Maureen O'Sullivan has the feminine lead as the lonely Balkan princess, with H. B. Warner as her father and a distinguished supporting cast that includes Joseph Cawthorn, Lucien Prival and Bert Roach. Alexander Korda directed the film from Alice Duer Miller's well-known novel of the same name. The picture opens at the Oasis theatre Friday and Saturday.

"Potentially, we are all every kind of character," says Edward G. Robinson, who plays the title role in "Little Caesar," which comes to the Oasis theatre Sunday and Monday. "Little Caesar" is First National's Vitaphone version of W. B. Burnett's famous best-seller. The novel was selected as the book-of-the-month by the Literary Guild recently. It vividly pictures the rise—and fall—of an American gang leader, especially dwelling on the psychology and traits and social environment which give rise to his type.

"I always look for the human side of every character I play, whether he be good, bad, or just indifferent. A character in a picture should never be regarded as a mere type. For instance, it is wrong to look on the gangster as a mere killer. As a matter of fact the biggest gangsters never do any killing. That is left to hired gunmen. The gangsters of today are a direct misdirected outgrowth of big business methods. They operate on the idea of trusts controlling everything. They are not content until they have wiped out rival gangs and control the whole business—because it is more economical to operate that way. The business king sometimes crushes his rival in an economic coup. The gangster, being outside the law, uses violent methods—the machine gun is his answer to competition. Efficiency, organization, business psychology, knowledge of human nature, and power in leadership of men—these are the things which go to give a head gangster, such as "Little Caesar," the position which he holds. And of course it is all twisted and warped—just human ability gone wrong."
