During the unusual wind storm recently that tore down and generally demolished the Umatilla County Project hog and dairy barns there was a general atmosphere of discouragement among farmers and



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members of the fair board. It would take more to rebuild the barns than the fair ever could cover with its financial returns and there was some talk of discontinuing the fair, which would mean the loss of the state appropriation.

At a meeting of the fair board Friday night a spirit was shown that proves the real benefits derived from the fair other than from a financial standpoint, which is brought out in the club work over the project. Club members work for better breeding of stock so that they might make entries in the county fair display and share in the club work alone justifies any effort put forth on the part of project residence to continue the fair annually.

The new fair board will engineer plans whereby labor may be donated to raise the buildings. Money that will be donated by the American Legion, Commercial Club, Farm Bureau and from other sources, justifies the belief that the majority favor putting every effort into retaining the Umatilla Project Fair the same as it has been for the past 18 years.

The fundamental purpose of such an enterprise is for the boys' and girls' club work and results will continue to be seen when such spirit as was shown Friday night prevails. Our fair will be bigger and better this year.

Modesty prevents us from uttering words of merit about the entertainment put on by the male quartet last Sunday evening, of which our copublisher was a member. The entire evening was devoted to quartet music, solos, violin solos, and duets. Such harmony is obtained only by constant training.

These boys Leander and Alfred Quiring, Henry and Sol Ediger are all from Dallas, Oregon, and up to the time Alfred left that city to come to Hermiston to assist in publishing the Herald the boys had worked together. They are all members of the Breidenthaler Mennonite church and have been trained from the time they were small boys.

The large crowd that heard the program expressed their appreciation.

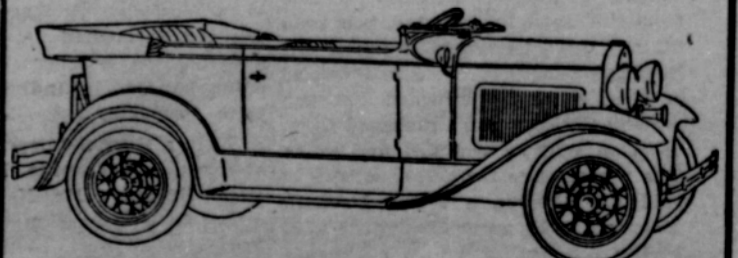
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
