STATE HOSPITAL COW IS OREGON CHAMPION

Oxford Rawleigh Yamhill has recently been declared Oregon state champion senior four-year-old Jersey cow. This pure-bred Jersey owned by the Eastern Oregon State hospital at Pendleton made a 305 day production record which was not equalled by any other Jersey cow on official test in Oregon during 1930. Hospital officials recently came into possession of the certificate of award and are feeling proud of the accomplishment. Walter A. Holt, county agent, says.

On the basis of present performance of Jerseys on official test at the hospital farm, it is practically certain that the institution will this year win one medal of merit, two silver medals, and two gold medals through the production performance of Jersey cattle which are now on test, it is asserted. R. A. Tillman, herdsman at the hospital, is handling the test cows, as well as all of the dairy cattle on the farm.

HAYING PRACTICES FOUND IMPORTANT FOR QUALITY

Quality in hay is largely dependent on its being cut at the proper stage, cured rapidly without bleaching or exposure to rain, and taken from the field as soon as it has cured sufficiently, according to D. D. Hill, associate agronomist at Oregon State college. Adequate equipment and labor to carry on each operation promptly are essential to production of good hay, he says.

Quality is determined largely by abundance of green color, and color is lost by poor cutting and curing methods, Hill points out. Hay cut too late, left too long in the swath, raked too soon, exposed to heavy dews or rains, heated in shocks or stack, or otherwise poorly handled loses color. Hay with poor color as a result of overripeness is woody and lacking in leaves.

Leafiness is important with clover.

DOLLAR DAY EXCURSION PLANNED BY UNION PACIFIC

PORTLAND, Ore., May 27 — Inaugurating the 1931 summer vacation season with the re-establish-

ment of cent-a-mile roundtrip transportation throughout Oregon and other parts of the West, Southern Pacific Company today announced plans for "dollar day" excursions to be conducted Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May 28, 29 and 30.

Comparable to previous cent-a-mile sales carried out by the company during the past three months, the forthcoming Memorial Day excursions will be enhanced by extension of the return limit to twelve days, midnight of Monday, June 8, it was stated by J. A. Ormandy, passenger traffic manager, northern district, for Southern Pacific. It will be the last "dollar day" event of the summer season, according to the announcement.
