LEAST ILLITERACY AMONG 33 STATES IS IN IOWA

Washington, D.C.—Iowa, with an illiterate population of only 0.8 per cent has the least illiteracy among the 33 states for which 1930 census figures are now available, the National Advisory Committee on Illiteracy announced recently. In actual numbers, there were only 15,879 illiterates in the state in 1930, the Committee said.

When Secretary of the Interior Ray Lyman Wilbur created the National Advisory Committee on Illiteracy, with the approval of President Hoover, in the fall of 1925, Iowa joined 42 other states and the District of Columbia to assist in a national movement which has as its primary object the reduction of illiteracy throughout the United States to a negligible minimum.

SECRETARY OF STATE EXPLAINS DRIVERS' EXAMINATION LAW.

Hal E. Hoss, Secretary of State, has released the following information, giving in detail the procedure to be followed by operators and chauffeurs in obtaining licenses in the future under the uniform operator's and chauffeur's license act.

Chauffeurs Heretofore Licensed.

Chauffeurs' licenses are issued for one year, or to expire on June 30th. (The chauffeur's license fee was reduced by the last Legislature from \$2 to \$1.) Persons licensed as chauffeurs, this last year, are being mailed application blanks for chauffeurs' licenses, good for the period July 1st, 1931 to June 30th, 1932. The application is to be properly filled out, sworn to before a Notary Public, or other person authorized to administer an oath, mailed to the Secretary of State with the fee of one dollar and license and badge will be mailed from the Secretary of State's office.

(Examiners will have Notarial Commissions in about ten days and will administer this oath without charge.)

New Chauffeurs.

Persons not heretofore licensed as a chauffeur and who desire a chauffeur's license will be examined by an examiner under the uniform operator's and chauffeur's license act, passed by the last legislature.

Operator's Licenses

Issued prior to July 1st, 1931. Operator's licenses, issued prior to July 1, 1931, will not be cancelled immediately, but will be cancelled within the next three years after due public notice. Until such time as they are cancelled they will be considered valid. Operators losing a license issued prior to July 1, 1931, may, on application to an examiner, secure a duplicate for 25c or the applicant may, after July 1st, elect to have his old license cancelled and secure a renewal under the new law, good for three years, after passing an examination and upon payment of a fee of 50c.

New Operators.

Persons who have never operated a car or who have never been licensed as an operator will be examined under the uniform operator's and chauffeur's license act. Applications of minors under 18 years of age must be signed by father, if living, and with the next of kin, otherwise by mother or guardian. If applicant has neither father, mother or guardian, then application must be signed by employer. After passing a test on the rules of the road, a vision test, a color blind test and such other test as may be necessary to determine his ability to safely operate a car, he will, on payment of a fee of \$1, be issued a Learner's Permit, good for 60 days, only when accompanied in the front seat by a licensed operator. When the applicant feels that he is able to safely drive a car, and his instructor is ready to sign to that effect, they apply to an examiner and the applicant is given an actual driving test, consisting of stopping, parking, backing and driving in traffic. Passing these tests before an examiner, his application is mailed direct from Salem. Applicants failing to pass the examination will be afforded further opportunities.

Where Examinations can be Taken.

Kent Shoemaker, Chief Examiner, has appointed examiners who will be in most of the principal towns in the state every two weeks, on certain days and at certain hours. Henry Lizaric will visit Pendleton, Milton, LaGrande, Enterprise, Baker, Ontario, Burns, John Day, Condon, Arlington, The Dalles, Hood River, Moro and Heppner, starting at Pendleton. Charles M. Bentley, will visit the same cities as Mr. Lizaric, starting at Burns.
