EXTENSION DAIRYMAN STUDIES HEREDISCOPES WITH FARMERS
Roger Morse, extension dairyman from Oregon State college, conducted a meeting in the Assistant County Agent West's office Tuesday afternoon at which twelve local dairymen were present, all of whom studied herediscopes. Another meeting was well attended in Stanfield Tuesday evening.

Only a small group of farmers can be instructed at one time as each person must have an individual herediscope in order to study it properly. Mr. Morse explained inherited characteristics and the necessity for dairymen to realize the importance of maintaining and using proven sires among their dairy herds. The importance of keeping a record of each herd was studied and all dairymen present were convinced that the results will soon be shown in production. Dairymen are working for larger and better production of butterfat from individual cows.
