Sixty years ago a young telegraph operator named Thomas A. Edison invented a method of sending messages in both directions at once on a telegraph wire. It was the most marvelous human invention up to that time.

He began experimenting with other electrical inventions, and before the Centennial in 1876 his name was a household word all over the world. He invented, among other things, the waxed paper in which the package groceries you buy are wrapped.

It is not too much to say of Edison that his inventions have revolution-

ized the world. They have changed our manner of living, our habits of thought, our whole scheme of things within one man's lifetime.

The great electrical wizard's serious illness at 84 has again focused the eyes of the world upon him. We hope that he will recover his health and keep on working until he is a hundred.
