"Public health nursing has become one of the most potent forces for raising the level of health and efficiency of the people," declares President Hoover in commenting upon the plan of the nurses national organization for a special membership enrollment. "I am interested to learn of the plan of the National Organization for Public Health Nursing . . . and wish you the fullest measure of success in your current undertaking and your continuing program for improving the health of the people."

The national endorsement committee formed for enrollment bears the name of an Oregonian, Mrs. Saldie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association and dean of Department Chairman of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. Among others on the committee are: Jane Adams, Mrs. Dorothy Canfield Fisher, Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, Dr. Hugh S. Camming, Mrs. Roger Sperry and Grace Abbott.

An increasing demand for public health nurses in schools and in rural and industrial sections is being felt throughout the country, according to Miss Mary Sewall Hardner, national membership chairman. "This is due, I feel to the stringency of economic conditions which have focused the public and professional eye on the importance of public health nursing." Public health nurses will face this year "the most challenging winter in the history of the profession," she states.

SPECIAL THANKSGIVING RATES ANNOUNCED BY U. P.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 10.—Re-establishing cent-a-mile fares in order to bring Thanksgiving Day reunions within the reach of thousands of persons throughout all parts of the West, Southern Pacific Company today announced plans for a renewal of their famous transportation bargains over the forthcoming holiday.

Under arrangements as perfected, trips may start Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, November 24, 25, and 26, with a return limit of December 3, according to statements by E. W. Clapp, general passenger traffic manager for the company. These dates were purposely timed to immediately precede and include Thanksgiving Day, Clapp said, and the return limit so fixed as to allow ample time for Thanksgiving trips to distant points on Southern Pacific's lines.

Territory involved, he declared, extends from Portland to El Paso and from San Francisco to Ogden, Salt Lake City included. As in the instances of previous "dollar day" sales, he added, roundtrip tickets will be sold on the basis of three-fifths the cost of the usual one-way fare. Tickets will be good on all trains, coach or Pullman, Clapp said.
