HEED IMPROVEMENT TESTS SHOW HIGH QUALITY

(Continued from Page One) and 74 cows averaged 673.6 lbs. of milk containing 28.6 lbs. fat.

Two high herds of mixed breeds of 12 to 20 cows were owned by C. R. Smith and Mortar Elder. The Smith herd of 15 cows averaged 709.4 lbs. milk containing 32.7 lbs. fat, while the latter herd of 16 cows averaged 617.4 lbs. milk containing 30.3 lbs. fat.

J. S. Dyer and Fred Beck are owners of the two high herds under 12 cows making the best average for the ninth month since the beginning of the testing year. The former herd of seven pure bred Jerseys averaged 524.0 lbs. milk containing 29.7 lbs. fat, and the latter herd, mixed breeds, averaged 581.9 lbs. milk, 23.2 lbs. fat.

The two high herds of the association were Rosadelle, of the Eastern Oregon State Hospital herd averaging 1419 lbs. milk and 85.0 lbs. fat. She is a pure bred Jersey, age 5 years. The second high test cow in the association is a 7-year-old grade Jersey, Bess Senior, owned by F. A. Baker, averaging 1185 pounds of milk containing 27.0 lbs. fat.

Twenty-one cows in the association were listed on the roll of honor with the highest test 85.0 lbs. fat and the lowest test 43.8 lbs. fat.
