PREDATORY ANIMAL CATCHES LOW FOR DECEMBER.

During December, thirty-one hunters took 148 coyotes, 17 bobcats and three cougars; in addition, 159 porcupines were destroyed. The hunters who made the largest catches are: Robert E. Long, Malheur county, 4 bobcats and 13 coyotes; James Wadman, Crook, 13 coyotes; Robert Palmer, Wheeler, 5 bobcats and 8 coyotes; Chas. B. Brown, Malheur, 1 bobcat and 9 coyotes; Clifford DeBok, Umatilla, 2 bobcats and 4 coyotes; Bart S. Robbs, Union, 10 coyotes.

General rodent control constituted the work of the Oregon staff during the month of December.

J. F. Branson arranged for mole control on several golf courses in the vicinity of Portland. The last part of the month was spent on annual leave.

H. S. Speer continued rat control in Portland. Seventy-seven inspections were made during the month. In each inspection, methods of control were given. In addition, Mr. Speer demonstrated methods of mole rapping at the Vancouver Barracks.

Roy Fugate assisted Mr. Branson in checking on mole infestation and rapping for control work during his first part of December.

During the middle of the month, a trip was made with the Leader attending the annual Columbia County Woolgrowers meeting at Vernonia and in contacting county agents, Forest Service officials, western and southern Oregon. Arrangements for future work was made at this time.

During the last of the month, rabbit control work was discussed with County Agent Lawrence and operators in Wasco County.

DR. JEKYLL AND MR. HYDE IS A GREAT PICTURE

Robert Louis Stevenson's great parable, "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," born through deft use of the resources of the talking film, at the Oasis theatre Sunday and Monday, has proved to be a revelation of what intelligence and skill really can do in a movie.

The analogy of the fluoroscope which transforms the invisible rays of light into a visible medium, occurs as the only one applicable to the direction of this picture which gives to screen audiences the subtle, elusive quality of Stevenson's story. The tale itself is all there, for those who will see only that, but nothing of the allegory, the insight into the quality of human nature that Stevenson glimpsed and Freud later was to reduce to formula, has been lost in the filming.

Fredrick March, in the dual role of Jekyll and Hyde, gives a performance that all those who see it will remember as long as they live. There is some pondering to the current public taste for horrors in the make-up.

Fredrick March reverts clear back to the Dawn Man as envisioned by the anthropologists—the missing link, if you will—with low, sloping brow, dilated nostrils and predatory jaw, but he has the artistry to complete the characterization with a springy, apish walk and an agility that is almost arboreal. Mr. March's Hyde is barely anthropoid and terribly effective.

There is much good material in the glee clubs and the operetta promises to be a good one.

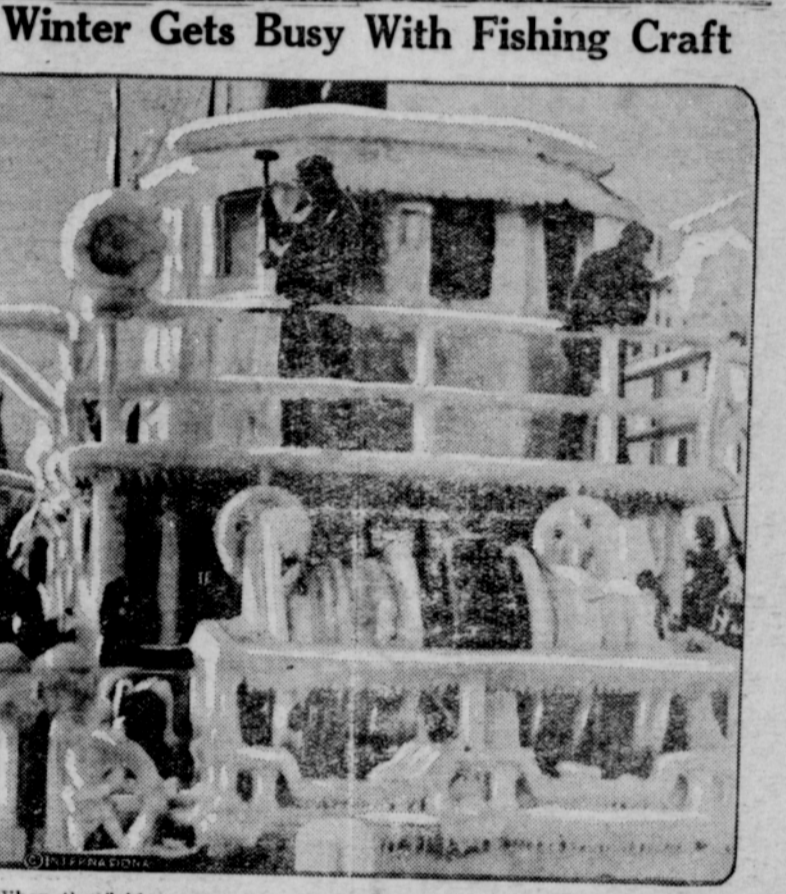
