PRESS, PUBLIC, SCIENCE BOOST INFANT INDUSTRY

How the press, the public and science can combine to encourage an "infant industry" for Oregon has been demonstrated in the present efforts in behalf of the distinctive and valuable evergreen huckleberry of the coast region. Recently scores of weekly and daily papers carried an announcement from Oregon State college saying that Dr. George Darrow, federal small fruits specialist there, and the home economics extension staff were eager to get fav-

orite recipes on ways to use these huckleberries.

The response was immediate, and within two weeks recipes had arrived for every thing from variations of the conventional pies to concoctions that a few declared had high medical value. Several men wrote in that they have been convinced for years of the possibility

of domesticating these berries and offered their accumulated experience.

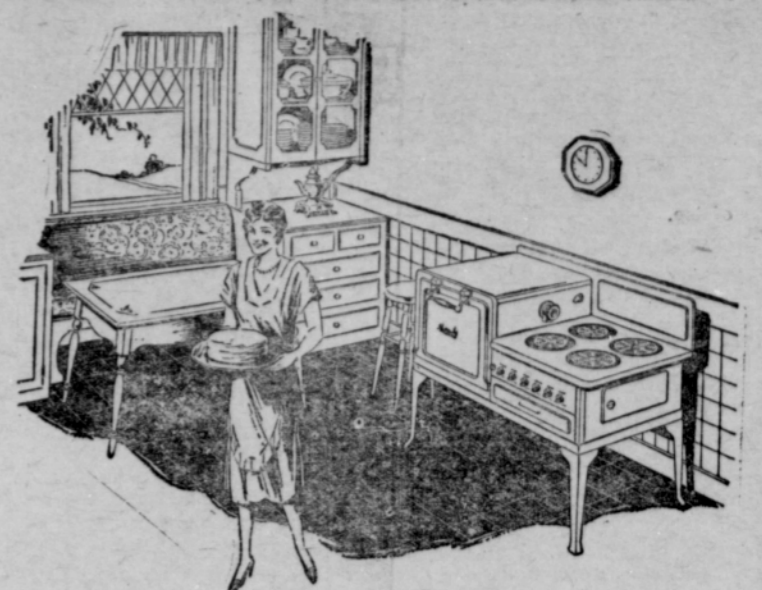
