"The Doctor is rather young, but nevertheless, he holds quite a prominent position in the world of science. He lectures at colleges and also maintains an extensive laboratory for private experiments.

"Next we see the doctor in his laboratory, amid an amazing array of test-tubes, retorts, mortars, flasks and myriads of bottles. He is working hard on the solution which he thinks will prove his theory.

"Dr. Jekyll repeats this process later and goes forth upon the streets of London. On returning he throws away the key to his study and resolves never to partake of the drug again.

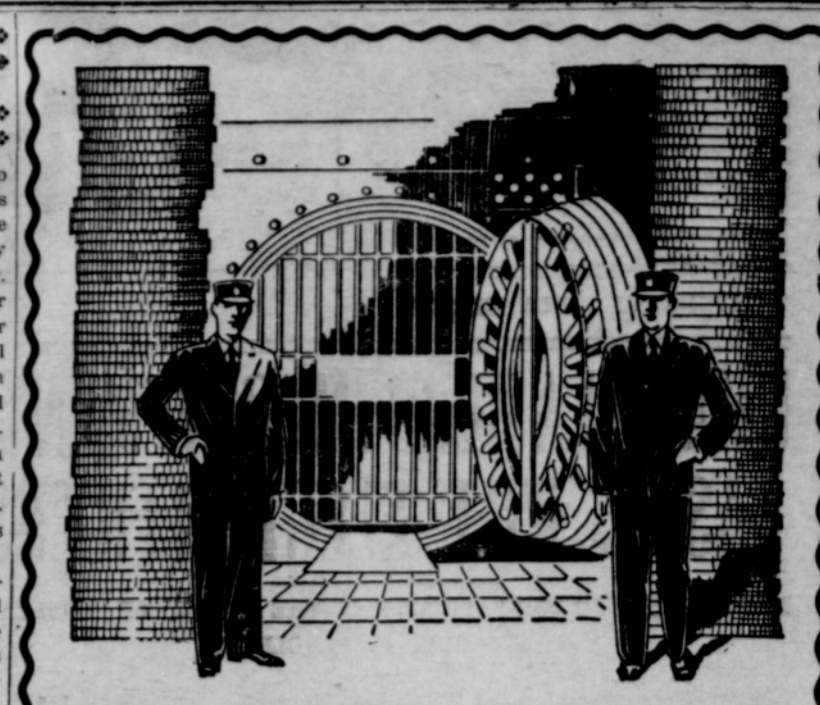
