CONSOLATION GAME PLACES LOCALS IN TOURNAMENT

Umatilla Drops first game.
Umatilla, thought to be one of the main contenders for the district tournament, failed to get into the game with Arlington until they ran up a lead of 9-1 in the first half. The third quarter ended at 15-5, and in a rally in the last quarter, the Umatilla boys added 8 points in rapid succession, coming within one point of overcoming Arlington, only to be noosed out by the final score of 15-20.

Through the splendid playing of Howard Cherry, formerly of Hermiston, Condon easily defeated Stanfield in a ragged game for the first Friday afternoon game, winning by 26-12.

Showing a good fight throughout the game, but trailing by only a few points, the lads from Iriragon were defeated by the Lexington quintet, 17-24, ending the first round of the tournament bracket.

Friday evening, the Hermiston Bulldogs, winners of the first morning's game mixed with the Arlington boys, winners of the second morning's game in a fierce struggle. Through the splendid playing of Jigly the Arlington quintet managed to gain a lead of eight points

as the half ended 13-21. In the third quarter Bowman dropped one in from the center of the floor while Arlington also added two more points for the only scoring of the close of the third quarter. The Bulldogs were unable to overcome the lead obtained by the Honkers in the first half, and the game ended at 21-29.

In the second game Friday night, Lexington ran up 16 points before Conday got started, leading at the half 3-18. However, in the third quarter Condon came back strong, getting 14 points to only four for Lexington. As the final whistle blew, Lexington still held the lead at 23-31.

Hermiston's Bulldogs matched the Condon boys for the consolation game Saturday night for the preliminary game. In the first quarter the Bulldogs gained a lead of three points, increasing the lead to six points at the half which ended at 1-17. The third quarter proved a downfall again for the Hermiston boys when Condon looped the basket with a long shot, tying the score at 1-17. Breaking away from under the basket, Bowman again dropped one in to be ahead at the end of the third quarter 21-23. Coming back strong in the last quarter, the Bulldogs defeated the Condon boys by a score of 29-34.

For the championship game of the tournament, Arlington easily defeated Lexington by a score of 30-49.

A large crowd witnessed games both days of the tournament. J. Steelhammer acted as official referee at all games.

Dean will head each school.
The six schools at Eugene: Law, social science, fine arts, physical education, business administration and commerce, and literature, language and arts.

The six schools at Corvallis: home economics, agriculture, physical and biological sciences, engineering, pharmacy and forestry.

Specialization Comes Later.
Under the plan, the freshman and sophomore years on the Eugene and Corvallis campuses will feature a general, all-around education, directed by a "director of lower division." In junior and senior years, together with post-graduate activity, will come specialization. Students will move from one campus to another, as required to obtain their degrees.

The school of journalism at Eugene, the course in industrial journalism at Corvallis and the school of mines at Corvallis will be abolished. The committee feels that technical training in journalism is not necessary and that the work in mines is being capably done by other western colleges. —The Oregonian.
