GAME FARM WILL RAISE MORE BIRDS THIS YEAR

A greater number of birds will be raised this year than last at the game farm near Pendleton, says Superintendent Lawrence Demagalski. Ten thousand were raised last season and liberated for the hunting season. There are now about 600 birds which have begun laying and of these there are approximately a third each of Mutants, Mongolian, and China ring necks with some Hungarian partridges.

Among the birds which will not be liberated but kept for show purposes are Silver, Japanese, Golden, and Black Neck pheasants.
