IN OREGON HOMES

WEST SIDE—A Lake county homemaker who has been concentrating on convenient kitchens since she was a little girl tells about her step-saving arrangements. She says, "I have a small pantry and by taking with me the milk or what liquid I need, I can make a pie or cake and

put it in the oven by taking just six steps. I can reach all the things I need while standing at my kneading board." And then this: "I put up a shelf in the kitchen at the end of the stove and it surely is handy. I have plans to make an ice box now. Can't afford to buy one but a few boards and sawdust will keep ice in good condition. I am handy with a hammer and saw and do all my own carpenter work."

MYRTLE POINT—A local aspirant for huckleberry cream cake recipe to the home economics extension service at Corvallis. It reads as follows:

Huckle Cream Cake
3 eggs beaten until light and lemon colored
1 cup sugar, beat into eggs
1 cup sweet cream
2 cups pastry flour
½ teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
Mix ingredients in order given and heat well. Then turn into ring mold and bake in moderate oven for one-half hour.

Filling
1 quart huckleberries
2 cups sugar (use only 1 cup sugar if berries are canned)
Let come to a boil and thicken with corn starch. Pour into cake shell and let cool. When cool top with whipped cream.
