NEW FEDERAL HAY GRADES EXPLAINED BY SPECIALIST

HAY GRADING SCHOOL HELD ON NEARBY FARMS.

Grades Being Inaugurated In State by U. S. Department of Agriculture; Improvement Seen.

Two hay grading schools were held on the project this week under the auspices of Assistant County Agent Best. The first, on the Ralph Richards farm on Butter Creek, Tuesday morning, and the second, Tuesday afternoon on the John Schmidt ranch near Stanfield drew farmers from both projects.

At these meetings D. D. Hill of Corvallis, associate agronomist, explained the new federal hay grades to hay growers and dealers.

These grades are being inaugurated in Oregon by the State Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture, and are expected to be quite an improvement over the old state grades.

GAME BIRDS AND FISH PLANTED ON HERMISTON PROJECT

FIVE-HUNDRED BABY CHINAS ORDERED FOR RELEASE.

D. D. Follett Named to Care for Game Birds Six Weeks Before Releasing Them.

The Hermiston Rod & Gun Club held its monthly meeting at the bank building last Thursday evening, June 2, with H. E. Hitt, president, in charge, and D. M. Deeter acting secretary-treasurer. Others present included B. S. Kingsley, J. A. Reeves, Geo. Wagner, L. C. Todd, Sam Moore, Wm. Shaar, J. S. Burnham, M. L. Watson, Otto Pierce A. M. Smith, Gwyn Hughes, Floyd Knerr, and Walter Hamon.

Mr. Hitt gave a talk on the distribution of the young pheasants and fish. He related the methods of caring for pheasants, and this work will be in charge of D. D. Follett for a period of six weeks and then the birds will be planted over the project at the most desirable places.

The fish, consisting principally of cat and bass, are taken out of the Columbia river near Portland with seine nets and loaded into trucks containing water and brought to the project in this manner and planted in the ponds. It was thought some would be planted above the dam in the Umatilla river. None will be put in the reservoir due to shallow water in the fall of the year.

The secretary-treasurer was instructed to order 500 baby pheasants through the state game commission, but the allotment of fish for this district is as yet, uncertain.

The coops and feeding material for the young pheasants will be brought down from Pendleton this week, and the pheasants will arrive next week.

Paid-up members now number 24, and anyone who desires to help carry on this good work of getting ponds on the project filled with more fish and enlarging wild game bird stock, can do so by paying fifty cents to A. H. Norton, and becoming a member of this organization.
