**STRAWBERRY MEN SEE FUTURE HOPE IN INDUSTRY.**

Strawberry prices may be ruinously low this year, but leaders in the berry production in western Oregon are still intensely interested in furthering and improving this industry, judging from the sentiments expressed by more than 200 growers and farm leaders who attended the annual strawberry day at the Oregon Experiment station farm at Corvallis June 3rd.

Most of the larger successful growers from Clackamas, Washington, Marion, Linn, Lane and other valley counties, together with county agents and vocational agricultural teachers, spent the day at the farm studying the effects of irrigation viewing the experiments in insect control, hearing the latest developments on diseases, and estimating the future possibilities of hundreds of new varieties now in fruit.

Particular interest centered on the new berry, U.S.D.A. No. 520, which Dr. George W. Darrow, berry breeding specialist of the federal department of agriculture is likely to pass the Etersburg in favor as a canning berry.

This berry yielded 9 1/4 tons to the acre at Hood River last year compared with one to three tons for the Clark seedling. It has a fine appearance, ripens more evenly than the Marshall, has a much better plant and is generally considered a higher quality. A number of the growers are already experimenting with it and these reported favorably on it at the field day meeting.

Nearly all the visitors came "loaded" with questions and were not backward in keeping at the specialists till their queries on spittle bugs, trinkle disease, rhizoctonia disease and scores of other problems were answered to the extent of present knowledge of them.

Growers expressed confidence in the future of berry growing in this state, believing that conditions will improve for those who are in the business in earnest.

**PLA YAT CASIS THEATER**

With a brilliant film play "Maurice Chevalier's 'One Hour With You,' the new bill that opens at the Oasis today offers about two hours of enjoyment without a dull moment, and not a serious one.

"One Hour With You," sparkles with bright dialogue and amusing situations, jeweled gowns and lilting tunes and deft performances by every member of the cast, especially the director, Ernst Lubitsch. The directorial touches are ingenious, effective and full of surprises. Frequently the story is told by insinuation—shadows moving on a wall or glimpses of reflections instead of the characters themselves. Or the picture may be interrupted by a bit of dialogue from a blank screen. Some scenes are done entirely in pantomime with a musical background. Occasionally in the course of the story the audience will realize that the conversation is in rhyme, and presently the players will be singing it instead of talking. Now and then Chevalier turns and takes the audience into his confidence speaking directly to the people in the seats. It is altogether novel and refreshing.
