The time of year for fire hazard is here. It behooves every citizen to watch his habits with cigarette stubs and matches. If traveling along the highway, do not carelessly throw a lighted cigarette stub to the side of the road where there is danger of its igniting, causing thousands of dollars damage to timber or

grain field. If in the mountains, be sure that the camp fire is safeguarded from spreading in the event that a few coals remain.

The Longest Day.

June 21, Tuesday, is classed as the longest day in the year, but C. C. Wylie, associate professor of astronomy at the University of Iowa, says that in reality December 22 will be the longest day of the year. He says June 21 will be the longest "daylight day" but that on December 22 will be long and here is his explanation:

"Because of the fact that we use mean time rather than apparent time, sun moon is later from day to day by about 30 seconds near the date of the winter solstice. In mid-November, for those living near a standard meridian, sun moon occurs about 16 minutes before 12 while in February it occurs about 14 minutes after 12."

"When the sun moon is falling later from day to day by a clock running on mean, or average time, the length of day defined as the interval from sun moon is more than 24 hours. In this scene the longest day this year is December 22."—East Oregonian.
