"It was only a matter of rearrangement but it has saved me many steps. I used to walk half way across the house to put away the dishes, now the distance is cut from 12 feet to 4 feet. The long kitchen windows were already placed crosswise and this I found very helpful when I started rearranging. Now all my working materials are near together and it helps wonderfully."
