THIRD IRRIGATION TOUR ANNOUNCED FOR AUGUST.

The third annual irrigation tour of the Willamette valley has been arranged by the Oregon Reclamation Congress in cooperation with the state college extension service and will be held August 18 and 19. A year ago such a tour attracted wide attention and stimulated interest in this type of farm improvement.

Final plans for the tour have not been completed but tentative arrangements are for the trip to be made through the counties of Washington, Yamhill, Polk, Benton and Lane, with about a half day devoted to experimental irrigation plots at the state college. Less ground will be covered this year, making possible better examination of the projects visited, says Arthur King, soils specialist of the extension service, in charge of advance arrangements. The tour is open to anyone interested.

1317 lbs. milk, and 65.9 lbs. fat. The former was a 6-year-old pure bred Jersey and the latter a 4-year-old grade Jersey.

High herd of over twenty cows for the month was owned by the Eastern Oregon State Hospital, 70 Jerseys and Holsteins, averaged 733.3 lbs. milk, and 30.5 lbs. fat.

Marion Stetson is the owner of 13 mixed Guernseys which was high herd of 12 to 20 cows, averaging 832.4 lbs. milk making 37.7 lbs. fat.

Seven pure bred Jerseys owned by H. B. Rees was high herd of under 12 cows, averaging 771.4 lbs. milk and 42.9 lbs. fat.

Voters Will Ballot On 13 Measures

vehicle and load exceeds 3000 lbs. Repeal of the state prohibition laws is provided in an initiative measure sponsored by Harry B. Critchlow of Portland, and for which petitions have been completed.

The taxpayers' voting qualification amendment, providing that all persons voting on tax levies and bond issues shall be taxpayers, is also complete and ready for the ballot.

Another proposed constitutional amendment referred by the legislature authorizes criminal trials without jury by consent of the accused person. This amendment was fathered in the 1931 session by Senator Crawford of Multnomah County.

A third proposed amendment provides that the 6 per cent limitation provision may be applied to levies of any one of three previous years, instead of the preceding year.

There also will be on the ballot three referendum measures attacking acts approved by the 1931 legislature.

One is directed at the 1931 legislative act which prohibits commercial fishing on the Rogue river. Another attacks the legislative act providing a tax of 10 cents a pound on all oleomargarine manufactured and sold in the state of Oregon. The third referendum directed at the legislative assembly is aimed at the act appropriating approximately \$1,182,000 for the support of the higher educational institutions.

WITH FARMERS AROUND THE STATE

OREGON CITY—A Clackamas county hmoemaker suggests strawberry muffins for the Sunday morning breakfast and recommends the following recipe:

- 1 pint fresh strawberries
2 tablespoons melted butter
2 tablespoons sugar
1 egg, well beaten
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup milk

Cut fresh strawberries in quarters and place one large teaspoonful of berries in each hole of the muffin tins. Cream butter and sugar, and add egg. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with milk and first mixture. Beat very little. Pour dough over berries. Bake 25 minutes or until done in hot oven (400 degrees F.).

EUGENE—That family eating habits have been materially im-

proved as a result of extension meetings in foods and nutrition is apparent when report blanks are summarized. From 19 communities, enrolling 400 homemakers, 3544 improvements are reported. These include 112 children drinking more milk, 173 adults drinking more milk, 173 individuals correcting constipation, 524 eating more vegetables, 335 eating more whole grain products and 317 eating more regularly. Suggestions on improved eating habits were passed on by those enrolled to 497 other homemakers. These meetings were supervised by Gertrude Skow, home demonstration agent, and Lucy A. Case, nutrition specialist in extension.

GRESHAM—New methods of preparing familiar foods and suggestions for the use of wheat as a cereal, dessert and meat substitute dishes are given as the most popular foods and nutrition helps received by Multnomah county homemakers enrolled in this project which was supervised by Frances Clinton, home demonstration agent.
