**WITH FARMERS AROUND THE STATE**

The average value of U. S. No. 1 alfalfa at 8 leading domestic markets during July was \$11.50 per ton, compared with \$15.25 in the corresponding month last year, and \$20.00 for the preceding five years, 1926 to 1930 inclusive. A strong holding tendency on the part of many growers has been noted this season as they are reported unwilling to sell at current bids, hence fair amounts are being stacked. Receipts at the Kansas City market for July totaled only 206 cars compared with a seven-year July average of 642 cars.

**HOMESPUN SENSE: ETHICS OF BANKING**

The function of a bank is, after all, a quasi-public one, and the banker who has no regard for the ultimate prosperity of his customers and his community will be very quickly condemned by the common sense of the latter, and will ultimately destroy not merely his own reputation but also bring about the downfall of his community.

In other words, the prosperity of a bank is founded upon the prosperity of the community and country in which it is situated.

**Sentiment in Banking**  
No sentiment in banking? Will you recall just one day's activity at your desk—what were the problems you considered? Did they apply solely to the cold-blooded conduct of the affairs of your bank, weighing, measuring, analyzing, valuing securities, extending credit, driving the best bargains possible, having in mind only the material return from your day's labor? Certainly such is not the case. I recall many days—happy days, too—in my experience in a very small country bank, in which I am sure not one-tenth of my time was given to the real consideration of the financial returns to my institution.

**Open Markets**  
I believe in an open market for the actual purchase and sale both of commodities and securities. But so long as the actual rate for credit in this country swings up and down according to the demand for funds for speculative purposes, little influenced by central or other banking policy, then something is wrong somewhere. Moreover, if business is influenced—as is almost universally charged—by the state of public mind; and if the state of public mind is influenced, as in recent years it most certainly has been, to run the scale from extreme optimism to extreme pessimism according to the characters on a ticker tape, then something is wrong with the public mind, or the conduct of the forces back of the tape. Those responsible must provide the answer.

Pendleton, Ore., 11.—(Special.)—Headed by such illustrious names as Dale McClure, Ike Rude and Bob Crosby, the list of top hands who will attend this year's Round-Up, September 3, 9 and 10, has reached twenty-three to date, according to word received by H. W. Collins, president.

Others who will take part are Hugh Bennett, winner of bulldogging contest at Cheyenne, Earl Foadie, 1932 winner of the Cheyenne bronco busting event; Hub Whitman, winner of the 111 around chairmanship trophy at Lill in 1931; Leo Murray and Guy Cash, bronco riders who went to the Finals at Cheyenne.

Among the calf ropers who are coming to Pendleton to try for part of the \$20,000 in prizes, are Roy Adams, Everett Bowman, King Merritt, Billy Wilkinson, Claude Farver and John Bowman, winner of the Calgary stampede.

Other names in the bronco busting, steer bulldogging and roping events which are well known to Round-Up fans and who will appear on this year's lists, are Richard Merchant, Carl Arnold, Hugh Strickland, Dick Fruit, Pete Knight, Chuck Wilson, Lloyd Saunders, Bob Askin and E. Fardeo.

Others are known to be coming but have not formally filed their names. The number of men and women contestants will exceed 250 cowboys and cowgirls by the opening date of the exhibition.

With the dates of the Round-Up this year tied in with those of the national convention of the American Legion at Portland, September 12-15, Pendleton sponsors of the exhibition are prepared to handle the largest crowd in the history of the organization. More than 5000 veterans on their way to Portland are expected to make Pendleton their first stop-over to witness the western classic of the range at which national championships are decided. Speed and perfect timing of the events prevent a dull moment from creeping into the two and one-half hours of entertainment.

**RADIO KOAC ANNOUNCES NEW HOMEMAKER PROGRAM**

A "Homemakers' Thrift Hour" is the latest feature arranged particularly for housewives, which has already been started over the state college radio station, KOAC. This is a daily feature given from 2 to 3 o'clock except Saturday when it is given from 9:30 to 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon.

This hour is being conducted by Mrs. Mary Little Thomas, graduate of the college and former home demonstration agent in California, now on the staff part time and doing graduate work in home economics at Oregon State. She was one of the first to broadcast home economics material over the college station before going to California.

Methods of food preservation such as canning, drying, salting, curing, storage and jam and jelly making will be included in the scope of the material to be given. She will also discuss planning and preparation of low cost meals, short cuts in house work, planting and care of fall gardens, and field reports of emergency relief work being carried on in the state.

This program, in fact, is closely allied with the work of the food committee of the state relief council and is designed to further the
