EUGENE—Striking results of the application of Bordeaux spray for control of walnut blight is seen this year in the orchard of J. O. Holt who cooperated this season in demonstrator experiment by Dr. P. W. Miller of the state college. Applications before and after blooming reduced the blight infection from 35 per cent on the check plot to 2.3 per cent. Tests this year show even more conclusively that time of application, even within a period of a few days, is the vital matter in success or failure of control, says Dr. Miller.
