INFORMATION AND RULES OF ENTRY TO EXHIBITORS FOR UMATILLA PROJECT FAIR.

INFORMATION TO EXHIBITORS

The Umatilla Project Fair is held primarily for the purpose of encouraging more profitable agriculture on the Greater Umatilla Project. In distributing the premium money the directors have emphasized the products of most importance.

No entry fee is charged. The Association will provide alfalfa hay and bedding free of charge, the exhibitor to furnish any other feed desired.

Reliable men will be in charge of the stables at all times and will feed for exhibitors on request. Pens are about 6 by 8 feet.

The Association will have experienced milkers, who, upon request of the owners, will milk all cows while on the grounds, free of charge.

Premiums—Premiums will be designated by ribbons: Purple and Blue, Grand Champions; Purple, Championship; Blue, first; Red, second; White, third.

Awards will be paid by check and mailed to the exhibitor's address not later than Nov. 1, 1932.

Board of Directors—R. C. Todd, President; Harry Kelley, Secretary-Treasurer; L. C. Dyer, C. A. Lynch, Lyle Tilden, John Jendrzewski, Roy Attebury, and Wm. Logan.

RULES OF ENTRY

Rule 1. All applicants for entry must be made on printed forms and in accordance with instructions on same. These forms, properly signed, are to be filed in the office of the Secretary of Umatilla Project Fair association on or before October 7, at 4:00 p. m., at which time entries close. In all cases the right is reserved to reject entirely or accept conditionally any entry or application for entry.

Rule 2. All stock entries must be on the grounds by 1:00 P. M., October 6.

Rule 3. To be eligible for competition, animals must be the bona fide property of exhibitors.

Rule 4. In all contests of registered stock the papers of registration must be filed with the Secretary not later than 6:00 p. m., October 6, if so requested.

Rule 5. Each exhibitor or assistant must be in charge of his entry during the hours of judging and demonstration under authority of the judges.

Rule 6. Exhibitors of livestock must report to the Superintendent in charge at 9:00 o'clock a. m. for orders. They must inform themselves from the Superintendent of the division when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the show ring promptly after being called, with proper entry tag attached.

Rule 7. All exhibitors of livestock shall be required to parade their stock when requested by the management. An exhibitor who fails or refuses to comply with Rule 5 and 7 forfeits all claim upon the Board.

Rule 8. If any disrespect is shown to any award or to the awarding committee, by the exhibitor or his agent, he shall forfeit all awards made to him.

and the officers in charge shall report the same to the Board at its first subsequent meeting. Should a premium be found by the board to have been obtained by false evidence, or misrepresentation, or a violation of any of the above rules, the money will be withheld by the secretary.

Rule 9. Men in charge of the stock are strictly prohibited from making any remarks regarding the stock unless information is requested of them by the Judges or Superintendents. Attendees infringing on this rule will be excluded from the ring by the Superintendents.

Rule 10. Exhibitors will at all times give the necessary and personal attention to whatever they may have on exhibition and at the close of the show must take entire charge of their property and remove promptly. Every exhibitor will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to or occasioned by, or arising from, any animal exhibited by him, and shall indemnify the Association against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto. The Umatilla Project Fair association will take every precaution in its power for the safe preservation of stock and articles on exhibit and all property of every character entered for competition or display, or for any other purpose, or being anywhere on the grounds, shall be subject to the control of the Umatilla Project Fair association, but in no case will the Umatilla Project Fair association be responsible in any way for any loss, damage or injury of any character to any such property while the same is on the grounds, or at any time or place. If the property owners or others interested in property desire protection against loss or damage or injury from fire or other causes, they must make their arrangements therefor. No Officer, Trustee, Superintendent or employee of the Umatilla Project Fair association has authority to suspend or change this rule.

Rule 11. No animal or article deemed unworthy shall be awarded a premium, and no premium shall be awarded merely because there is no competition. If the article is not worthy of the first premium, it may be awarded a lesser premium, and where there is but a single exhibitor in any class, the judge may award but one premium. Without competition money next lower than ribbon awards will be paid.

Rule 12. Boar tusks must be removed.

Rule 13. No female dairy animals of breeding age which have not been tested for and found free from infectious abortion will be admitted to the show grounds.

Rule 14. No bull over one year old shall be removed from stalls for any purpose, unless handled by two men.

Rule 15. NO EXHIBIT MAY BE REMOVED FROM THE FAIR GROUNDS BEFORE 8:00 P. M., SATURDAY.

\$75,000 IN PREMIUMS AT EXPOSITION IN PORTLAND.

Portland, Oregon, Sept. 7—Premiums amounting to approximately \$75,000 will be awarded winners at the 22nd annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition to be held in Portland, Oregon, October 15-22, according to an announcement made by General Manager O. M. Plummer. The premium list is now being distributed and extra copies may be had from Mr. Plummer, 221 American Bank Bldg., Portland, Oregon.

The cash prizes are divided approximately as follows: \$8,800 in

the beef cattle division; \$8,700 in the dairy cattle division; \$5,000 in the sheep division; \$3,000 in the hog division; \$5,000 in the horse division; \$4,500 for all classes of fat cattle, sheep and hogs; \$10,000 for the best bareback bronc-riding, calf-roping, bronc-riding, steer-wrestling and steer-riding at the famous McCarty-Elliott Rodeo, a spectacular new feature at the Pacific International; \$5,000 for Boys' and Girls' 4-H Clubs; \$2,750 in intercollegiate, Boy and Girl, 4-H Club and Smith-Hughes Vocational Education Judging Contests. The prize awards for the Land Products Show will be announced at a later date.
