"If nothing happens I want to take a trip some spring and spend the summer going over the country I used to roam thirty years ago.

"I hope you will pardon me in taking the liberty to write you, but would like so much to hear from Hermiston.

The men of whom Mr. Mabson spoke were among the earliest pioneers on the project. Only one, J. H. Reid, is now living here.

The City of Hermiston was named as is stated in the letter by Mrs. McNaught, from an estate in Scotland known as the Hermiston estate.

Mrs. Hutchison Named. Mrs. Baxter Hutchison was named in the article as the originator of the idea of the laundry and cannery which has lightened the burdens of many housewives on the project.
