

PROPOSED ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE granting to The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, the right and privilege to do a general telephone and telegraph business and to place, erect, lay, maintain and operate in, upon, and under the streets, alleys, avenues, thoroughfares and public highways within the City of Hermiston, poles, wires and other appliances and conductors for the transmission of electricity for telephone, telegraph and allied purposes of communication.

The City of Hermiston Does Ordain as Follows:

Section 1. There is hereby granted by the City of Hermiston to The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, the right and privilege to do a general telephone and telegraph business within said City of Hermiston and to place, erect, lay, maintain and operate in, upon and under the streets, alleys, avenues, thoroughfares and public highways within the said City, poles, wires and other appliances and conductors for the transmission of electricity for telephone, telegraph and allied purposes of communication.

transmission of electricity for telephone, telegraph and allied purposes of communication. Such wires and other appliances and conductors may be strung upon poles or other fixtures above ground, or at the option of the grantee, its successors and assigns, may be laid underground in pipes or conduits or otherwise protected, and such other apparatus may be used as may be necessary or proper to operate and maintain the same.

Section 2. It shall be lawful for said The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, to make all needful excavations in any of such streets, alleys, avenues, thoroughfares and public highways in said City for the purpose of placing, erecting, laying and maintaining poles, or other supports or conductors for said wires or repairing, renewing or replacing the same. Said work shall be done in compliance with the rules, regulations, ordinances or orders, which may during the continuance of this franchise be adopted from time to time by the City of Hermiston.

Section 3. Whenever The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, shall dis-

turb any of the streets for the purpose aforesaid, it or they shall restore the same to good order and condition as soon as practicable without unnecessary delay, and failing to do so the City of Hermiston shall have the right to fix a reasonable time within which such repairs and restoration of streets shall be completed, and upon failure of such repairs being made by said Company, its successors and assigns, the City of Hermiston shall cause such repairs to be made at the expense of said The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns.

Section 4. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed in any way to prevent the proper authorities of the City of Hermiston from sewerage, grading, planing, rock-ing, paving, repairing, altering, or improving any of the streets, alleys, avenues, thoroughfares and public highways within the City of Hermiston in or upon which the poles, wires, or other conductors of said Company shall be placed, but all such work or improvements shall be done if possible so as not to obstruct or prevent the free use of said poles, wires, conductors, con-

duits, pipes, or other apparatus. Section 5. The said grantee, its successors and assigns, hereby agrees with the City of Hermiston to indemnify and save harmless the said City of Hermiston against all damages, costs and expenses whatsoever to which the said City may be subjected in consequence of the acts, neglects or defaults of the said Company, its agents or its servants in any manner arising from the rights and privileges herein granted.

Section 6. Whenever it becomes necessary to temporarily rearrange, remove, lower or raise the aerial cables or wires or other apparatus of the grantee to permit the passage of any building, machinery or other object, the said grantee will perform such rearrangement on seven (7) days' written notice from the person or persons desiring to move said building, machinery or other objects. Said notice shall bear the approval of such official as the Council may designate, shall detail the route of movement of the building, machinery or other objects, shall provide that the costs incurred by the grantee in making such rearrangement of its aerial plant will be borne by the person or persons

giving said notice will indemnify and save said grantee harmless of and from any and all damages or claims of whatsoever kind or nature caused directly or indirectly from such temporary rearrangement of the aerial plant of the grantee.

Section 7. In consideration of the rights and privileges hereby granted, the City of Hermiston shall have, and the said The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company hereby grants to it the right and privilege to place, where aerial construction exists, a fixture on the tops of poles erected and maintained under this franchise to which may be attached wires not exceeding four, and where underground conduit exists the said The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company shall furnish the said City with one duct in its main underground system, excluding pipe or other conduit dips connecting one pole with another, or two pairs of wires in its main underground cable, free of charge to said City, to be used for low tension police and fire alarm purposes, it being understood that it shall be optional with the grantee as to whether two pairs of wires shall be given or a duct in the underground sys-

tem. Provided, however, that said The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company shall not be responsible in any manner whatsoever for damages caused by the failure of said police or fire alarm systems, or any part thereof, to operate, and the City of Hermiston hereby agrees to hold said The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company harmless of and from any and all claims, damages or liability of any kind whatsoever caused, directly or indirectly, by the failure of said police or fire alarm systems, or any parts thereof, to operate.

Section 8. In further consideration of the rights, privileges and franchise hereby granted, said grantee, The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, shall pay to the City of Hermiston from and after the date of the acceptance of this franchise and until the expiration thereof the sum of Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00) per year, and the said sum annually shall be in lieu of all licenses or other charges which might be imposed on said grantee, its successors and assigns, except City Taxes regularly assessed on a property valuation basis as all other property in the City is assessed. Payment of said sum of Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75.00) shall be made on or before the 15th day of January of each and every year for the calendar year preceding, with the exception that in the year 1933 payment shall be made only for the period commencing on the date this franchise becomes effective by its passage and approval, and ending on December 31, 1932. This franchise may be forfeited by failure to make the payment herein provided for.

Section 9. The rights, privileges and franchise herein granted shall continue and be in force for the period of twenty (20) years from and after the date of the passage and approval of this Ordinance.

Section 10. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and approval, which said passage shall take place not less than twenty (20) nor more than ninety (90) days after the completion of publication of this Ordinance, at least twice in a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Hermiston as required by the City Charter, and the said grantee shall, within thirty (30) days of the passage of this Ordinance, file with the Recorder of the City of Hermiston, its written acceptance of all the terms and conditions of this Ordinance.

The foregoing is a proposed Ordinance being considered by the City Council. Any one interested may discuss the same with the Council at any regular meeting up to and including the meeting of December 7, 1932.

Lower License Fees Must Come!

Secretary of State Hoss insists that automobile owners are entitled to lower license fees. We agree with him but also believe that the license fees now imposed on small privately owned trucks should be reduced.

WHY?

Because, for years, automobiles and small trucks have been carrying the load of highway construction and maintenance while the heavy truck and trailer freight outfits, operating for compensation and hogging and destroying our roads, have been escaping with ridiculously low fees.

For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1932, the state collected, in license and mileage fees, \$6,548,000. Of this amount the freighters (Classes 4 and 7), nearly 3000 in number, paid but \$300,000 or around \$100 per vehicle for the year.

In the year 1931 the State Highway Commission was obliged to spend over \$7,000,000.00 for reconstruction, betterments and maintenance—burdens imposed largely by the operations of heavy vehicles.

Our proposed Highway Protection Law makes it the duty of the State Highway Commission to classify all traffic on our highways, determine the burden imposed by each and make recommendations to the Governor for a redistribution of all license and mileage fees.

When this is done lower license fees for automobiles and small trucks should follow.
