**Fertilizers Increase Hay Yield.**

INDEPENDENCE—Heavy increases in alfalfa yields were obtained here this year by Tom Paine through use of land plaster and super-phosphate on different tracts. Land plaster at the rate of 200 pounds per acre gave a yield of almost 6

tons of hay without irrigation. Applied at the rate of 100 pounds the land plaster did not show so well. Super-phosphate did even better in Mr. Paine's opinion and he plans to use more of it at 250 pounds per acre. The trials were arranged in cooperation with the county agent.
