A. M. Gaunt, 100-year-old civil war veteran, died at his home at Harrisburg last week.

An apple tree in the W. L. Townsend yard in London, Lane county, has blossomed for the second time this year.

The Douglas county fair board has made a special appropriation of \$75 for displays of Douglas county birds at the Northwestern Turkey show this year.

Elisha Large will continue to serve as mayor of Eugene. His reelection is not opposed. Likewise R. S. Bryson is unopposed for reelection as city recorder.

George Gordon, 9, son of the Rev. G. Gordon, pastor of the Beaverton M. E. church, broke both wrists when he fell while at play on the school grounds.

The Rev. John Richardson, for 4 1/2 years rector of St. Pauls Episcopal church of The Dalles, has resigned to accept a call to St. Georges church at Bismarck, N. D.

A child's shoe, found recently at a bend in the Umatilla river below Pendleton, spurred on the search for the body of Maxine Price, 6, drowned in the high water of May 7.

Boys took three out of five prizes offered in cookery in the 4-H club contest at the Dechutes county fair. The boys concentrated on cookies and won first, second and fifth prizes.

A fire that started in peat soil near Klamath Falls swept over 3000 acres of grain and pasture fields. It was estimated that over 1000 acres in grain had been destroyed by the blaze.

Mrs. Anna Junk of Salem had an exhibit of 23 paintings at the State fair. She is 84 years old, and one of her pictures was painted when she was 30 years of age. Painting is her hobby.

Bill Pedro, Jr., of Heppner killed a 243-pound deer near La Grande, and on his way home stopped at a Pendleton restaurant to eat. When he returned to his car the deer was missing.

A total of 6000 cans of salmon has been received from Gold Beach by Jackson county and an equal amount of canned corn, beans, tomatoes and pears will be returned from Grants Pass.

Silverside salmon have begun to arrive in Rogue river, near Gold Beach, and good catches are being made daily. This promises to be a good sport for fishermen for the next six weeks.

Picking of the Newton apple crop of the Rogue river valley is under way. It is estimated that the total crop will run between 300 and 400 cars. Eighty per cent of the pear crop has been gathered.

More than 40 men were sent from the Siskiyou national forest service office at Grants Pass to fight a fire bordering the Redwood highway on the switchback the other side of Oregon mountain.

A female deer with antlers is the proud possession of Dr. D. J. Legg. He shot the animal in the Modoc country, across the state line from Klamath Falls. The antlers were still covered with velvet.

It is reported at Reedsport that the Coast Fisheries, Clyde Chase, manager, is purchasing fish from many points along the coast to fill an order for 1,000,000 pounds of their mild cured product, a form of smoked salmon.

A 2-mill decrease in Bend's tax levy for 1933 is indicated in a proposed budget calling for the expenditures of only \$59,945, compared with a budget of \$105,635 in 1932. The proposed tax levy is \$55,645. For the current year it was \$99,535.

Potato Storage Important.

HILLSBORO — Washington county potato growers have found out by experience that care in storage of seed potatoes pays big dividends. Trials conducted by several growers in cooperation with County Agent Cyrus showed as much as 20 to 40 per cent variation in yield the following year may occur between lots of seed that have received different storage treatment. Putting potatoes on slatted floor, or building a slatted tunnel in the cellar or pit has given good results.

Sheep Range Being Improved.

CRITERION—W. E. Hunt, southern Wasco county stockman, has obtained a mixture of promising grass seed through County Agent Lawrence which he is using in an attempt to improve his sheep range. The seed consists of tall meadow oat grass, brome grass, chewing fescue and orchard grass.
