GOVERNOR MEIER AND HAL HOSS IN AGREEMENT.

In a letter this week to Secretary of State Hal Hoss, Julius L. Meier, Governor of Oregon, recognizes the merit of the position consistently taken by the Secretary regarding the automobile license fee, by agreeing on the point raised by Hoss last summer concerning the need for legislative action to cure the present evils of a too high license. Hoss, it will be remembered, has been steadfast champion for a lower license fee, but realized that it required action by the state legislature to bring about the desired result.

A year ago last April, soon after the Washington legislature enacted a \$3.00 license fee, Secretary Hoss took an active part in the program to bring about a revision of Oregon license fees, and since that time has been working on plans which he will have ready for the action of the next session of the legislature.

In his letter asking Hoss for his views on the automobile license problem, Governor Meier said he wished to have them for consideration in connection with his message to the legislature, and went on to invite the Secretary to present other matters concerning any of the latter's departments which he believed would be furthered by a recommendation in the Governor's Message.

In effect substantiating and endorsing the stand taken by Secretary Hoss last summer regarding the proper procedure to correct the conditions that face Oregon motorists today, the Governor's letter says, in part:

"Believing that you share my interest in arriving at a solution of this problem which will be in the best interests of the state as a whole, I desire to avail myself of your experience and facilities of your office. It appears that if any relief is to be afforded, legislative changes are necessary. I should, therefore, appreciate having you submit your view of this matter for consideration in the preparation of my message, together with your recommendations as to legislation which you consider desirable in this connection."

Hoss has indicated that he will

discuss his plans with the Governor and be prepared to present a number of statistical compilations covering license fees and gasoline taxes to the automobile committees of the legislature when it convenes in January.

Poultry BEST TO "CUT OUT" TUBERCULOUS HENS

Safest Method Is to Raise New Flock.

It is generally conceded that the fowl tuberculosis germ is not carried in the eggs, and, therefore, eggs are perfectly safe to use, even though the hens laying them are in the earlier stages of the disease. The tuberculosis germ is one that is quickly killed by heat, hence cooking would destroy such germs even if they were present.

We doubt if it is advisable to keep a flock of hens having tuberculosis to any considerable extent. Avian or fowl tuberculosis affects chiefly the liver and other digestive organs. The disease is communicated by food or water contaminated by bowel discharges; hence when a large number have the disease, keeping the healthy looking fowls usually means perpetuation of the disease, for one by one those that have the germs in them will reach the consumptive stage and scatter more infection. If you want to keep pullets or healthy looking young hens you should confine them to a yard that can easily be made safe by changing the top soil. Let the disinfection of the range begin at once.

There is a tuberculin test by which the disease can be weeded out of a flock in the course of two or three years, but unless the flock is a valuable one the better plan is to change completely, beginning with chicks and raising them on clean ground. -Nebraska Farmer.

NOTICE OF SCHOOL MEETING

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of School District No. 14, of Umatilla County, State of Oregon, that a SCHOOL MEETING of said district will be held at the school house, on the 19th day of November, 1932, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon for the purpose of discussing the budget hereinafter set out with the levying board, and to vote on the proposition of levying a special district tax.

The total amount of money needed by the said school district during the fiscal year beginning on June 20th, 1932, and ending June 21st, 1933, is estimated in the following budget and includes the amounts to be received from the county school fund, state school fund, elementary school fund, special district tax, and all other moneys of the district.

When the budget meeting is held in connection with the annual school meeting, the following provision of section 232, School Laws 1929, should be observed: "Until the ballots are counted at least one hour after the time set for the meeting in districts of the second and third classes, any legal voter of the district shall be entitled to vote upon any matters before the meeting."
