Principal Events of the Week Assembled for Information of Our Readers.

Christmas trees, 22,000 linear feet of them, will go from the Rogue river national forest, formerly known as Crater national forest, to San Francisco this year to aid the arrival of Santa Claus.

The Salem Chamber of Commerce will be host, October 24, to all members of the American Legion drum corps, the national champions, and to the prize winning American Legion auxiliary trio.

The first season's flight of geese to the rice fields of California passed over Gold Beach last week. The Indians always regard the southward migration of geese as a sign of the early approach of winter.

Josephine county's auto license collections are nearly \$4000 in excess of those of a year ago. For the year beginning July 1 the total collections are \$36,159 as compared with \$32,244 in the same period last year.

Thousands of cords of wood are being hauled from the mountains this year by residents at Milton to save buying it. Ranger Baker of the Umatilla national forest, who has his station at Langdon lake, at the Toll Gate, said that permits had been issued for more than 13,000 cords.

Frank Mielick, 29, pyromaniac on parole from the Arizona state hospital, confessed to setting the Brownsville fire which destroyed property valued at \$30,000. State police are holding him at Medford while his story is being checked.

Ten thousand acres of land in the Elk Flat country of the Umatilla national forest are being treated the second time with gopher poison. The first treatment, applied last year, exterminated 90 per cent of the rodents, it is estimated.
