1,000 PEOPLE WILL CELEBRATE ARMISTICE DAY HERE

ELABORATE PREPARATIONS ARE BEING MADE.

Raising of Colors at Sunrise Will Officially Open the Day; Parade Will Be Colorful.

Some 1000 people, men, women, and children, will forget their cares and worries for one day at the expense of old man depression as guests of Hermiston at the big Armistice day celebration to be held here November 11. A committee representing the different local organizations has sent the call far and wide, inviting people for miles around to join in the festivities and merry-making.

A bugler, a color guard, and a squad of veterans will officially open the day at sunrise when they will raise the colors in honor of those who have served their nation well.

The program for the day has very seldom, if ever, been equalled in this region and includes a big parade, community singing, an address, a football game, a free barbecue, and a dance. The address will be given by Don McLeod, well known Hood River Legionnaire, and past vice commander of the American Legion, department of Oregon.

At 2:00 o'clock Hermiston high school's football team will meet the Heppner high team. A charge of 50 cents will be made for the game. Immediately following the game the gates will be thrown open to all and a free barbecue, including sandwiches, coffee, salad, and apples, will be served. Henry Sommerer, who is in charge of the barbecue, says that a huge cement-lined pit will be made immediately in front of the building which is used as an office at the project fair; the pit will be used to prepare the steer and hog which will furnish meat for the sandwiches. The pit will be permanent and will probably find further use next summer.

Udey's orchestra will furnish the music for the dance which is under the supervision of the American Legion; a charge of 50 cents a couple will be made to cover expenses.

The Parent-Teachers' association recently purchased a soccer ball and indoor baseball bat for the use of pupils in the upper grades.

Registration for the presidential straw poll which is to take place at the high school next Tuesday is well under way. Any high school student may express his choice for national, state, county, and local offices in this major election if he registers first. Previous membership in any political organization or activity in its work does not disqualify the voter. The election is under the supervision of the history and civic classes.

PIERCE ADDRESSES DEMOCRATS AT POLITICAL RALLY

A large crowd attended the Democratic rally held at the Hermiston Union church last Thursday evening to hear Ex-governor Walter Pierce, Mrs. Pierce, and democratic candidates for county office. H. J. Stillings, local resident, presided and introduced the various speakers.

O. F. Steele, candidate for the office of county assessor, and "Bob" Goad, candidate for sheriff, presented their claims for election followed by the main address of the evening given by Mr. Pierce, candidate for congress from the second congressional district. The main points of Mr. Pierce's talk concerned his advocacy of the debenture plan, free coinage of silver, and immediate increase of income and inheritance taxes. Mrs. Pierce, who is stumping the district with her husband, was the last speaker of the evening presenting her reasons for voting for Mr. Roosevelt for president.

Bulldogs Play Pendleton Team

BULLDOGS WILL INVADE BUCKAROO TERRITORY SATURDAY.

Saturday, November 5, Hermiston high's Bulldogs will invade the Pendleton Buckaroo eleven's corral to match skill with the best that fair city can offer. Both teams will be at top form for the game and in games played last week showed both to be strong.

Hopes for the Bulldog victory over the Pendleton team were strengthened last Friday when the Purple and Gold made a splendid showing against an undefeated Waitsburg eleven. The Waitsburg team, which is one of the strongest teams in this section, met with real opposition from the lighter Hermiston players and did not have the game in the bag until the final whistle.

During the first 8 minutes of play two drives into Waitsburg territory featured by end runs and line plays netted the Bulldogs a touchdown against a team whose goal had been crossed by only one team this season. Waitsburg soon retaliated by crossing the Bulldog's goal following a series of razzle-dazzle reverse plays which at first swept the Bulldogs off their feet. Conversion of the try for goal made the score 7-6 for Waitsburg at the end of the first quarter.

When the final whistle blew the score stood 26-12 for Waitsburg. Good sportsmanship and a fine type of football displayed by both teams made the game one of the best of the season.

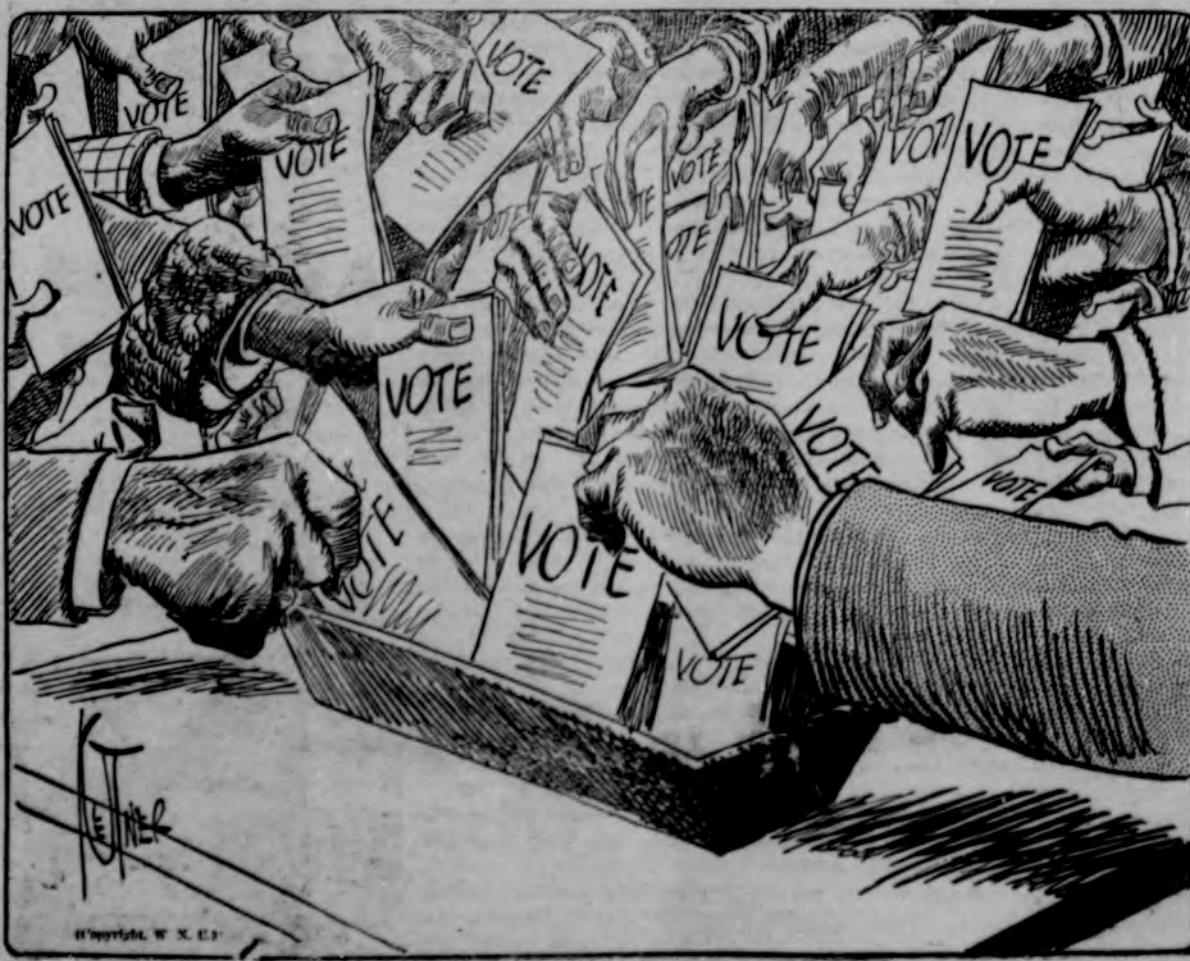

Newport Company Granted Road Job

HIGHWAY GROUP LETS MORE THAN \$1,000,000 CONTRACTS.

News of the letting of more than \$1,000,000 in federal-aid highway contracts, the largest amount of work let at a state highway commission meeting in years, was welcome in this community, especially when it was learned that the Newport Construction company of Portland, with its bid of \$129,475, won the Wallula cut-off surfacing contract involving 19.71 miles in this county.

Ross Newport, member of the firm, was a resident of Hermiston until recent years and still owns property here. It is said that the Newport Construction company will make its headquarters in Hermiston.

The Wallula cut-off highway job was considered as one of the big jobs in the group which also included the Wolf creek short-cut route, and a number of small bridges. Many of the contracts, it is said, were let pending approval of the bureau of public roads, or pending conferences with various county courts in the matter of secondary highway jobs, but these are not expected to change the results materially.

The projects will, or should, put 2000 men to work within a very few weeks, highway engineers have estimated. This includes the men employed by sub-contractors and all others associated with a project.

The Wallula cut-off highway, when completed, will link a main traveled highway in Washington to the Old Oregon Trail highway at Umatilla where an overhead crossing is being built.

FILE PETITIONS WITH RECORDER

THREE IN RACE FOR OFFICE OF CITY RECORDER.

F. C. McKenzie Up for Mayor; Contest for City Recorder Promises to be Close.

A complete lineup of city officials was filed with the City Recorder last Friday in addition to Chas. Taylor and R. C. Todd who had previously filed petitions signifying their candidacy for the office of city recorder.

A petition circulated last Friday evening named the following local citizens on the official ballot for the City of Hermiston: F. C. McKenzie, Mayor; A. F. Rohman, treasurer; and six councilmen, B. Haneline, H. E. Hitt, B. S. Kingsley, J. M. Norton, J. G. Pearson, and Geo. Wagner. Mrs. Rena Waterman filed a petition earlier in the day which placed her name on the ballot as a candidate for city recorder.

The contest for the office of City Recorder will be followed with interest as all three candidates have lived in the community for many years and are well and favorably known. Chas. Taylor, present incumbent, has proved his ability for that office during his term the past two years. He is also associated with the Hermiston Irrigation district. Mr. Todd has been active in city and county politics for a period of years and is well qualified for the office if elected. Mrs. Waterman is also a pioneer resident of Hermiston, having come here when the project was new. She has shouldered the responsibility of her family and is a deserving person.

According to J. S. West the registration for precinct No. 32 and 33 is larger than for previous years. On November 8th, 346 people will be qualified to vote between the hours of 8 A. M. and 8 P. M. in precinct No. 32 compared to 432 registrations in precinct No. 33. Polls for precinct No. 32 will be located in the Hermiston Union church, and voting in No. 33 will take place at the library building.

Sample ballots may be obtained at the Herald and other business houses in town for both city and county.
