Local Residents Make Predictions

I predict Hoover's election over 300 electoral votes. During the last three weeks the swing to the president has been very strong throughout the entire country, especially in the West. This has been due to Hoover's major speeches, and a very intensive campaign by state speakers, a wide distribution of literature and the extensive hookup of radios.

The issues of the campaign have been so well explained that the prejudice against the president has been overcome in a large degree. Business men, large and small, and 30,000,000 of the employed prefer to remain in a safe position and the farmer is turning against any modification of the tariff downward, and the voters generally are swinging to the belief that the Hoover economic program is the only thing offered that will lead us back to prosperity.

Hoover will carry New England, including New Jersey and Delaware with 60 votes. He will also carry ten big mid-west states including New York with 213 electoral votes. He will also carry California, Oregon, Oregon, Utah, and Colorado, with a fair chance at Idaho, Wyoming and Washington. He may lose Illinois because of state political differences.

The biggest factor in the campaign is Hoover's own speeches which demonstrate his profound knowledge of all political questions and a heretofore unknown forcefulness of character.

Al Smith's speech at Newark settled some questions and reintroduced others proving favorable to Hoover and the fact of a general swing of sentiment will determine thousands of late decisions.

In the coming election Roosevelt will get two-thirds of the electoral votes and Hoover one-third, making the vote stand 344 electoral votes for Roosevelt to 177 for Hoover.

The Literary Digest Poll gives Roosevelt 41 states to Hoover's 7, but for the sake of fair play and being conservative, I predict a two to one victory for Roosevelt. In past elections the Literary Digest poll has been less than 5 per cent. incorrect.

Roosevelt will carry Oregon by a 25,000 majority, and will lead in Umatilla by 1,000 majority.

Walter Pierce will be elected to congress by 5,000 majority over Butler. Gov. Pierce will carry Umatilla county by 1,000 votes. Brady, independent candidate, will get less than 5,000 votes in the district. Starkweather, democrat, will be elected to congress in the first congressional district, while Martin will be re-elected to congress from Multnomah county.

Judge Jim Maloney of Pendleton will be elected State Treasurer; Mr. Prestlye will be elected county judge; Mr. Steels will be elected county assessor; Geo. R. Lewis will be elected district attorney; William Meiners will be elected county commissioner.

The race between Steiwer and Gleason for U. S. Senator will be close. As a whole this is a democratic year and there is no particular state that can be pointed out but that might go for Roosevelt.

HALL HOSS SLASHES GOVERNMENT COSTS

The slashing of operating costs by a total of \$180,000 during the current biennium has been an accomplishment of the secretary of state's office, according to the biennial report being prepared this week by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, for the January legislative assembly.

"Savings resulting from this retrenchment program will revert in part to the general fund to help reduce the state deficit, while the balance will go to the state highway fund and to the counties that participate in the automobile license fund. The current savings are part of my economy program that was instituted in 1928," pointed out Secretary Hoss.

"The biennial report shows budget estimate reductions in the general office, maintenance of capitol buildings, reductions in the motor vehicle department, and features the low operating expense of the gasoline tax department, which is less than any other state in the Union with similar laws. Bills for hotels and meals for employes of my department were less than any other official.

"All of the employes of the department of state, including myself, have taken salary cuts as recommended last spring," Hoss declared.
