BULLETINS ON VEGETABLE GROWING RELEASED

Four new publications on the growing of young plants under glass are now available at the office of the County Agent in Pendleton. These may be had by simply asking for them as they are provided without cost by the Oregon State Agricultural College.

Circular 251 deals with the growing of early vegetable plants under glass, and Circular 258 covers the construction and operation of the manure-heated hotbeds.

Another bulletin which has been available for a few months is Station Circular 307 which discusses electric hotbeds and propagating beds. Those interested in rhubarb will find available another publication discussing the forcing of that crop. This would be useful to the home gardener, and possibly for commercial rhubarb growers.
