C. W. Garrison.

Sunday, December 11th, marked the passing of one of Stanfield's most esteemed citizens, C. W. Garrison, who was a native son of Oregon. His death occurred some time in the night and was probably caused by a severe paralytic stroke, as he was in apparently good health when he retired.

Mr. Garrison had suffered a stroke about twelve years ago when he was paralyzed for several weeks. He fully recovered from the effects of this and was very active and busy to the last.

Clarence W. Garrison was born in Polk county, Oregon, June, 1857. When a young man he went to St. Helens where he met, and later married Katie Williams.

In 1905 he moved his family to a ranch west of Echo where they lived until about 10 years ago when they came here to make their home. He was preceded in death by Mrs. Garrison, who passed on four years ago. Surviving children are: Clarence, Jack, and E. Garrison of St. Helens; and Dorr Garrison of Stanfield, with whom Mr. Garrison made his home.

Funeral services were held Tuesday, December 13, from Zells Funeral Parlors at The Dalles, with A. W. Prann of Hermiston in charge of the body. Interment was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery beside his wife, mother and sisters.
