Above you is a solid rock—at least you hope it's solid—and below you is more solid rock. Crawling through this crack you go, just room enough above you to give you a bump on the head once in a while. The passage is quite wide for some distance. Then we come to an almost solid wall, and, still crawling, turn a right-angle corner. There is room here for a person not too large, but one too close to two hundred will puff before setting himself through. Just this corner we ascend a gentle slope, still of solid rock and still with a low ceiling. By this time your hands and knees are tired, and you wonder if your wrists will bear the strain longer. You may as well go ahead—it's nearer to the Temple than it is out! Of course you have to return this same way, but the sights are worth it. In the innermost room will repay you. Here are found the snowy sheets of limestone on the wall, in undulating waves resembling falling water—and which are named Niagara Falls. Near them, hanging from the ceiling, are those stalactites which, when struck, emit musical tones. The simple scene here, and those of us who have gazed in here have found just which ones to strike to play, quite creditably. "America" overshadows all in your mind, the dark shadow behind all this beauty, is the presence in this room of the Pit. The Bottomless Pit, it is called, and comes as near deserving its name as anything. You may lie on its edge—careful, now, not too close—and drop into its depths. No matter how still the rest of the party keep, you'll find it hard to stand on the edge. No sound ever comes back from the inky well, and you slip carefully back from the edge with an eerie feeling.

full of the smell of whisky. Temperature doesn't solicit on every street corner. The weeds near the hospital are not full of drunks. The wards are not full of miserable, abused children. The hospitals don't have lellirium-tremens wards. The Salvation Army doesn't send around trucks to pick up Saturday-night drunks. In Philadelphia they used to pick up 4,000 drunks on Saturday nights. They don't have trucks now because they don't need them.

"Mrs. Sabin doesn't know what she's talking about. She didn't see the children I saw. In the winter the children of drunks froze. The parents weren't low and depraved. They were drunk and they forgot their children. I remember an Oklahoma laborer who brought his three children to Kansas City, put them in a cheap hotel room for the night, and got drunk. Three days later we received the child that was left alive.

"My nurses can walk down the street at night now. I remember when they couldn't. Beasts slept or oitered or watched on vacant lots. I can tell you stories of horror, and my nurses.

"I remember when virtually all our cases were the cases of children mistreated by drunken fathers and mothers, frozen, starving, abused unspeakably, not by bad men, but by good men—good men drunk.

"I know little rich girls who complain to me that I'm wrong. They say they want liquor back. Children, my friends, will play with poison. They don't know any better. I do."

Wyandotte Cave

"Back through the same tortuous passage of Worm Alley, and through many more rooms and corridors until I stop in a room and ask if you wish to cut across, thereby saving a very considerable retracing of steps. By this time you're tired enough to be anxious to get out for your dinner, so you'll agree. Possibly you'll want to go another passage than the one which I tell you is the long way around, but you'll have to trust me. Having agreed to the "cut-off", I tell you that I go first; that the passage is solid rock above but soft, dry sand below, easy to dig out to any size. Even the heaviest may plan to go safely through the cut-off. So I drop to my knees. He down on my stomach, and slowly disappear through a reasonably small crack in the wall, which you hadn't noticed. In a short time you hear my voice, encouraging you to follow. The crack is not high—something like creeping under a bed. One by one you follow me, with more or less difficulty. Somehow it appears harder than when I told you about it, and the space not so large as at first. Especially is this true if the crowd is a jolly one, and I have been able to get some of the leading spirits to help me. For truly there is an art in even so simple a thing as crawling through here. Those who know how, may cause an almost unlimited amount of difficulty to the ones coming later if they use just the right twist of the elbow to push the sand behind them—the hole just fills up, and some weighty person in frantic haste to get through, doesn't think of pushing it to one side.

"Clid rock above and below, or cold rock above and shifting sand below—both of them tight places to get out of. Put it, you keep your head, and don't get excited, they may be passed safely.

In closing, may I wish for you that you'll keep your head in tight places, whether in the cave or out."
