## DAIRMEN ELECT THREE DIRECTORS AT MEETING.

(Continued from Page One) Mr. Witherall stated that the production cost had gradually been reduced as the volume of butterfat handled increased. The report showed that all outstanding indebtedness incurred to start the plant had been paid. Settlements are made to the members every two weeks. Mr. Witherall stated that the books had been kept efficiently at all times which enabled him to obtain an accurate report. The next speaker was Roger Morse of the state college who spoke to the membership on cooperation. Mr. Morse stated that the Hermiston plant was one of eight cooperative associations in the state of Oregon and had added materially in increasing the market output made by the Interstate Creameries during 1932, which was increased by 22%. Two other creameries, at Redmond and Wallawa, were also named as aiding materially in this increase. Mr. Morse stated that the success of the Interstate Creameries association depended upon the loyalty of its members, just as the success of the local creamery depended upon the loyalty of its members. The personnel of the board includes E. L. Jackson, president; R. V. Jones, L. C. Cooney, L. C. Dyer,

A. E. McFarland, A. C. Heyden, L. F. Wooster, and M. G. Hedwall, secretary and treasurer. Herd Improvement Assn. Meets. Following the creamery meeting, members of the Umatilla Herd Improvement association met and elected officers as follows: C. R. Coppock of Adams, president; L. C. Dyer, secretary-treasurer; Chas. Lynch, Hermiston; Harry Rees, Stanfield; and L. W. Owens, Pendleton. The association is working on a little different method of organization, details of which have not been completed, but which will probably be carried out in the near future. INEXPENSIVE BREAKFAST DISHES SHOWN IN LEAFLET. Starting the day with a good substantial breakfast is an important factor in healthful living, according to nutrition specialists. That such a breakfast need not be expensive is a point made by Miss Lucy A. Case, nutrition specialist in the extension service, who has prepared for free distribution a leaflet giving suggestions for inexpensive breakfast dishes. In addition to general suggestions and 11 recipes, two sets of menus are included, one for the outdoor workers and one for indoor workers. Cereals such as rolled oats, corn meal and coarse graham can be purchased in large quantities, in cloth sacks at a considerable saving, says Miss Case. Wheat and corn in condition as harvested, can be taken to the nearest mill to be cleaned and ground for a small charge. Un-

ground whole wheat has a variety of uses in the home, many of which are noted in the extension bulletin No. 450, "Uses of whole wheat in the home." Powdered skim milk is an inexpensive substitute for skim milk and can be used in such dishes as cocoa, junket, scalloped vegetables, pudding, ice cream and bread. Miss Case explains. With the addition of a half pound of butter to one pound of dry skim milk, one may obtain the equivalent of five quarts of whole milk. Beet sugar costs slightly less per 100 pounds than cane sugar and has the same food value and uses. Manufacturers' sugar costs even less than beet sugar though it is somewhat coarser. Where the homemaker's labor has money value a large saving can be realized by making bread at home, suggests Miss Case. Another money saver is cooperative buying of large quantities of foods which may be handled without waste. Copies of the leaflet "Suggestions for Inexpensive breakfast dishes" may be obtained from the home economics extension service, Corvallis, or from any county extension office. Stem-rot Hits Alfalfa. CARLTON—A stem or crown rot appears to be causing considerable loss to alfalfa stands in Yamhill county, according to examination made by S. T. White, county agent. Fields affected appear to do well in the spring, produce a good first crop and then fail to send out later growth, many plants appearing dead in the fall.
