REGED BY PRESIDENT
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found to require reorganization to put them on a sound basis.
"I ask amendments to the federal reserve act to provide for such additional currency, adequately secured, as it may become necessary to issue to meet all demands for currency and at the same time to achieve this end without increasing the unsecured indebtedness of the government of the United States.
Immediate Action
"I can not too strongly urge upon the congress the clear necessity for immediate action. A continuation of the strangulation of banking facilities is unthinkable. The passage of the proposed legislation will end this condition and I trust within a short space of time will result in a resumption of business activities.
"In addition, it is my belief that this legislation will not only lift immediately all unwarranted doubts and suspicions in regard to banks which are one hundred per cent sound but will also mark the beginning of a new relationship between the banks and the people of this country.
Grave Responsibility
"The members of the new congress will realize, I am confident, the grave responsibility which lies upon me and upon them.
"In the short space of five days is impossible for us to formulate completed measures to prevent the recurrence of the evils of the past. His does not and should not, however, justify any delay in accomplishing this first step.
"At an early moment I shall request of the congress two other measures which I regard as of immediate urgency. With action taken thereon we can proceed to the consideration of a rounded program of national restoration.

type of particularly persistent mite has just been identified by the entomologists at Oregon State college who were appealed to for help by a distracted Oregon poultryman.

This new breed is a close relative to the common chicken mite, says Dr. Don C. Motte, head of the entomology department. When present on fowls these mites multiply rapidly and congregate at certain spots on the body, where feathers become rough and dirty from the effects of the parasites. English sparrows and blackbirds have been known to carry these mites.

Preliminary tests indicate they are fairly easy to control once discovered, as dipping in liquid louse killer or dusting with very fine sulfur are effective, while use of nicotine sulfate on the roosts has killed many of them. Further observations are still being made of best control measures.

Home-Mixed Oil Sprays Practical.
HOOD RIVER—Three years of careful testing on the local experiment station farm has shown the practicability of home-prepared oil sprays and the new Tank-Mix oil sprays, which are said to cut the cost of such spray materials in two for the orchardist. Full directions for making or preparing these sprays have been included in a new Station Circular No. 107 entitled "Oil Spray Recommendations," now available for free distribution either at the local experiment station or direct from Corvallis, says Leroy Childs, Hood River station superintendent. The new bulletin also contains a condensed list of latest recommendations regarding use of either dormant or summer off sprays as determined by the Western Co-operative Oil Spray project of which the Oregon station is a member.
