MINERAL FEEDS SUBJECT OF NEW O. S. C. BULLETIN.

Mineral feeds will not compensate for careless feeding practices, but an adequate supply of certain mineral salts is essential to normal growth and reproduction among farm animals, according to a new bulletin, "Mineral Feeds", by Dr. J. R. Haag, chemist in animal nutrition at the Oregon State college experiment station.
