BROAD PROGRAM PROPOSED FOR FOREST LANDS.

A land use program affecting more than a third of the entire land area of the United States is presented in a comprehensive report just transmitted to the senate by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace, announces the regional forester, Portland, Oregon. The report was prepared by the U. S. forest service in response to a resolution introduced by Senator Royal S. Copeland.

The report presents a coordinated plan intended to insure all of the economic and social benefits which can and should be derived from productive forests by fully utilizing the forest land, and by making all of its watershed, recreational, and other resources available in quantities adequate to meet national requirements.

Main findings, as summarized in Secretary Wallace's letter of transmittal are as follows:

1. That practically all of the major problems of American forestry center in, or have grown out of, private ownership.
2. That one of the major problems of public ownership is that of unmanaged public lands.
3. That there has been a serious lack of balance in constructive efforts to solve the forest problem as between private and public ownership and between the relatively poor and the relatively good land.
4. That the forest problem ranks as one of our major national problems.

As the only assured means of solving the forest problem, the report recommends, first, a large extension of public ownership of forest lands, and, second, more intensive management on all publicly owned lands.
