Corn to be Grown in Polk County.

DALLAS—Corn will probably prove to be one of the best crops in Polk county this year, due to the shortage of hay and pasture. It will be used for green feed for stock, for filling silos and for ear or shelled corn feed. J. R. Beck, county agent recommends Minnesota 13 or Golden Glow as the two best varieties, with McKay Yellow Dent ranking third best. The seed supply of the latter variety is said to be limited, however.
