"KING KONG" COMING TO OASIS FOR THREE DAY SHOWING.

 titles of rock at some places without covering the rails.
 This fact constitutes a problem in removing the material from the largest cut. As a small amount of rock must fall from the cuts when any blasting is done, and more must be pushed over by the shovels, making room to work, the tracks had to be protected. The difficulty was solved by using a shovel to remove talus slides, which occupied the small space between the railroad and vertical cliffs. The excavated material from the highway was then dropped in the cleared space, from which it was again removed. In one case this maneuver was repeated a number of times to move all the material.
