What is Justice Dealt Here?
What is the matter with our laws of Oregon, or the whole United States when they permit Game Wardens and road police or traffic officers to come to peaceful farm homes where an honest farmer with his young son, barely seventeen, are hard at work trying to make an honest living and pay their taxes; to keep a home over their heads; and catch the son alone, tell a trumped up story of the West, lies, implying that the father had broken a law that would mean a jail sentence and a fine of not less than \$350.00.
This boy, knowing how hard the father, fifty five years old, had labored the past years and how scarce money was, sought to save his dad further worry. He was frightened into signing a confession that he had killed a duck out of season. As a result the father was forced to leave his work, borrow money to take the boy to Ione, Ore., a distance of 65 miles one way, where the boy was fined \$25.00 and costs. And because the father had no money, the boy was taken to Heppner jail. Returning home the same day, to save the mother from a nervous breakdown, and the son from the disgrace of being in jail, borrowed the money from a kind neighbor, and drove back to Heppner the same night to get the boy.
I ask you is there any justice in laws when they will allow officers to blackmail an honest man?
The story was based on a thin charge by a disgruntled bachelor who had moved into the neighborhood recently and had allowed his stock to feed on this farmers crop continually, though asked kindly to take care of them. And when compelled to keep them up retaliated by making a flimsy charge, that he has since confessed before a witness, that he told the officer he could not swear to.

This farmer and boy were W. C. Isom and son Donald, well known throughout Morrow and Grant county, and during his 18 years in Oregon has never been known to break a law. He came here from Iowa with a record of honesty and integrity that has been proven in his life here.
Game Warden Francis may think he has done a fine thing to put into the State Treasury \$27.50 in his idle moments that will cost this father and son longer hours of hard labor with no recreation, and as a consequent result ill health for the parents. I ask again, are our laws created to make criminals out of our boys. Are not our officers just licensed racketeers when they are permitted to carry out such a scheme of making money. Officer McMahon had the confidence of this boy and he had often said what a fair and square officer he thought McMahon was. What has this one act done for this boy not to mention the hard working, law abiding parents, that has caused them to lose respect for officers as well as the law for which they stand, and no act in the future can ever erase the harm they have done.
I repeat. Something is wrong with our laws when men are hired to fill these offices, not for their honesty and integrity, but for their

glibness of tongue and their ability to concoct stories to frighten innocent boys or girls, not familiar with their tactics, into false confessions. And because parents of these same boys and girls haven't the money to hire lawyers and stand a trial against a man or men who has the government back of him to furnish money to help him out.
