\$262,000,000 LOST IF PROHIBITION IS REPEALED.

Liquor's most recent claim is that liquor will give the federal government a billion two hundred and fifty million dollars a year in revenue. Nothing said about "education for temperance". It is now a race to see who can get the most money—the liquor business or the government.

Just before prohibition the National Wholesale Liquor Dealers' association of America in its campaign text book for 1917 uttered these words on its title page:

"National prohibition would mean the loss of \$262,000,000 revenue to the treasury of our national government. National prohibition would mean the loss of \$21,000,000 revenue to the various states of the union. National prohibition would mean the loss of \$6,600,000 revenue to the various counties of the United States."

A quarter of a million dollars was a small sum. Is raising of the price a good argument for loosing the hell-hounds of liquor on America?

And note, in the figures above, the pitifully small amounts given to the states. Liquor propagandists and states. Liquor propagandists has made many believe that liquor paid huge taxes to local treasuries. Actually liquor paid much less than water taxes. The liquor business and liquor men were among the leading tax dodgers.

DEADLINE FOR OREGON DRIVERS' LICENSES NEAR.

After midnight August 31, only Oregon drivers' licenses issued since July 1, 1931 will be effective. Those failing to secure renewals will find their old licenses cancelled and themselves in a position of having no license at all, according to Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state.

Police officials have indicated that immediate enforcement of the new motor vehicle law will be made. Regardless of where a person is located in the state he may avoid action from such authorities by securing from the secretary of state's office a regular application form, having his signature sworn to and and re-

turning the application together with the \$1 license fee.

More than 40 per cent of the applications for renewals are received by mail through the main operators' division office in Salem and approximately 25 per cent come in from the traveling examiners. The remaining 35 per cent of the applicants make personal contact through the Salem or Portland offices.
