A MESSAGE TO EVERY MEMBER.

TO THE MEMBERS OF UMATILLA CO-OPERATIVE CREAMERY.

There has been some confusion in the past regarding the By-Laws and Marketing Contract of the Umatilla Co-operative Creamery due to the fact that many of the members misinterpret the meaning of some of the Articles.

Many prospective members refuse to sign the Marketing Contract simply because they have been misinformed and consequently are afraid that they will be seriously handicapped in conducting their affairs on the farm.

Every member should study his copy of the By-Laws and Marketing Contract. Those who do not have a copy may obtain one by asking for one at the creamery office or by asking the truck drivers to leave one.

Article III, Section 2 of the By-Laws concerning the purchase of stock on the basis of one share of common stock of \$10.00 par value for each cow or major fraction thereof, has been amended and reads as follows: "Each member shall subscribe for stock in the association on the basis of one share of common stock of \$10.00 par value for each one thousand pounds of butterfat marketed. Deductions for this stock to be at the rate of one cent per pound."

The money you have paid for stock has been used to pay off your indebtedness. In other words, this stock represents your part in the ownership of the business.

The plant you bought was of course entirely inadequate to handle near the volume of cream produced by the members as the organization began to grow. It has been necessary to replace worn out, out of date machinery with new machinery capable of handling more than twice the amount of cream formerly made into butter in your plant.

There are only three more payments of \$118.00 per month to be made on your pasteurizer, the last one will be paid in December. At that time, you will be clear of all indebtedness and you will be the owners of a fairly modern plant as far as equipment is concerned, however, it will be necessary in the near future to build a new cold room as the old one is by far too small and is badly rotted and full of mold, which is very detrimental to the keeping qualities of butter.

As the funds subscribed for stock will soon accumulate because of the decrease in payments made each month, it will be possible to call in some of your stock certificates by the first of the year.

You members of the Umatilla Co-operative Creamery should be proud of your organization which has grown rapidly in spite of lean years brought on by low prices. You are always welcome at your plant or at the monthly meetings of your Board of Directors. You may examine the books representing all of the business transaction made by the management at times when such a procedure will not seriously delay work in the office.

The business is yours and is operated for your benefit and there is no intention on the part of the management to keep you in the dark. Your Directors are all producers and have your interests at heart at all times. If you have any complaints to make, go to the Director of your district, not to your nearest neighbor or one of your competitors.

Your attention is respectfully called to Section 12 of your Marketing Contract which reads as follows: "The member agrees to give written notice immediately to the association upon any sale or lease of his farm, or herd, or at any time he gives up the production of or control of dairy products, and he further agrees to give such notice immediately upon making a chattel mortgage covering any part of his herd. His failure to give such notice shall make the member liable to the association for liquidated damages, if his transferee or mortgagee shall fail to deliver contracted products to the association, provided, however, that if any transfer of the farm or herd, whether by sale, gift or lease to any relative of any degree, or to any person in trust, during the term hereof, shall be deemed to have been made subject to and conditional upon compliance with all of the terms hereof by such transferee, and the member hereby agrees to be responsible for such compliance with all of the terms by such transferee."

This Article is not as tough as it sounds. It does not mean that you are tied, hand and foot; it is there

The Umatilla Project Farm Bureau is an organization of farmers created to provide a means whereby social and economic problems and community betterment can be discussed, considered and carried out in an organized way. Any bona fide farmer is eligible to membership. The organization was started as the Columbia Farm Bureau in the Columbia district in 1920 with a membership of 25 farmers. This initial organization was affiliated with the county, state, and national American Farm Bureau Federations. In order to pay county, state and national remittances the dues were \$3.00 per year.

A few years later the county and state set-ups ceased functioning and those outside relations were severed. After this action the dues were reduced to \$2.00 per year.

The "Umatilla Project Farm Bureau" was adopted as the name of the organization when the membership was extended to farmers in territory beyond the Columbia district.

Members dues are now \$1.00.

EMERGENCY HOG MARKETING PLAN FOR OREGON EFFECTIVE

The following information was received this week by Assistant County Agent Garnet D. Best, from the cooperative extension department at the Oregon State college:

Emergency hog marketing plan now in operation in Oregon. We have just received information that during the week ending September 15, 2000 pigs weighing from 25 to 30 pounds and 1500 pigs weighing from 81 to 100 pounds, or 600 visibly piggy sows weighing 240 pounds and up will be accepted at North Portland under the government hog reduction plan.

Before shipment original owners must obtain permits from some commission firm at North Portland by wire or otherwise, and such permits for shipment must be evidenced by a letter or telegram to the original owners. Farmers may have their pigs handled through cooperative shipping associations or by country buyers by supplying the latter with telegrams or letters constituting the permits authorizing shipment. Such agencies also may act on behalf of the original owners in securing permits.

An equal number of pigs or piggy sows as indicated in the foregoing paragraph will be received at North Portland during the week ending September 23.

Further information concerning the hog marketing plan is contained in Mr. Ballard's circular to you under date of August 22 and in Agricultural Adjustment Administration circular "Instructions for Selling and Shipping Pigs and Sows under the Emergency Hog Marketing Plan," which each of you should have.

REPORT SHOWS PRESENT ENROLLMENT OF 601.

Lynch, Owens, and Luttrell Herds Rate Near Top With State Hospital Over 6 Months Period.

The August report of the Umatilla Herd Improvement association shows that the Guy Chamness herd has been added to the association. Mr. Chamness lives in the Westland district. It was also shown that three unprofitable cows were culled from the T. G. Gregory herd near Stanfield, during the month of August.

The two cows testing highest in the association this month are owned by the E.O.S. Hospital at Pendleton. They are No. 81, a 4-year-old Holstein, producing 1773 lbs. milk, testing 78.0 lbs. fat, and Bowlina, 6-year-old pure bred Jersey, producing 1119 lbs. milk, testing 64.9 lbs. fat.

A total of 601 cows were enrolled this month out of 41 herds, with 107 dry cows. These cows produced 303,383 lbs. milk containing 13761.2 lbs. fat. Fifty-six of these cows averaged 40 lbs. fat during the month.

The E.O.S. Hospital had the highest herd of over twenty cows which are Jersey and Holstein, producing 562.3 lbs. milk containing 28.9 lbs. fat.

Highest herd of from twelve to twenty cows is owned by L. W. Owens. These cows are pure bred Jerseys averaging 622.3 lbs. milk which tested 31.2 lbs. fat.

For the six months since the beginning of the testing year the E.O.S.H. places first in its class and the Chas. Lynch herd of 45 Holsteins, producing 4637.6 lbs. milk testing 161.7 lbs. fat, placed second in the same class.

A herd of between twelve and twenty Jerseys owned by Wm. Luttrell placed first in its class producing 4078.4 lbs. milk testing 177.1 lbs. fat, and the L. W. Owens herd placed second in the same class for the six months period.

Fourteen cows were listed on the honor roll for the month of August. This report was issued by Al Kenings, tester for the association.

EXCESS MOISTURE AIDS IN ALFALFA WINTER KILL

The biggest single factor in the winter killing of alfalfa is the supply of moisture in the soil and consequently the moisture condition in the plant, according to H. K. Dean, superintendent of the Umatilla Field Station, when interviewed on the subject of winter killing of alfalfa. September and October are usually very dry months, so that we do not get a good supply of moisture into the soil from rainfall in time for the plants to make beneficial use of it.

The worst killing on the station was across the middle of the borders while the head-ends and the low-ends, which had better moisture supplies, came through in fairly good shape.

This has been further brought out by a number of observations on this project this year where part of the field received a late irrigation and part did not. The killing being much worse in the dry area.

While it is not probable that we will have weather conditions which will cause killing every year, we have had them frequently enough that we should put the fields of alfalfa in the best possible condition to withstand killing by giving them a good irrigation after the last crop has been removed.
