ington. Captain Ward said, would not aid navigation on the mid-Columbia or on the Snake. The great need, he stated, was for a water route from Asotin, Wn., and Lewiston, Idaho, to tidewater.

Krute Hill Attends. Congressman Walter M. Pierce of Oregon, Krute Hill of Washington, and Compton I. White of Idaho, were attending the hearing.

R. H. Kinn of Portland. R. H. Kipp of Portland filed a written statement that was not read during the hearing. The statement recited that the army engineers have recommended the building of a dam at Bonneville and that all forces should unite in support of the construction of a dam at that point.

Mr. Kipp's statement was in conflict with a letter from Major General Lytle Brown, which was read during the hearing by G. A. Hartman. In his letter, written August 14, General Brown recited that the division engineer's report related to the feasibility of a dam at the Cascade sector but said that the engineers do not recommend priority for the Bonneville dam over the other proposed sites, this being a matter to be determined by higher authority.
