WHEN SHOULD PULLETS BE HOUSED?

H. E. Crosby, Poultry Extension Specialist from Oregon State college, sets forth the following reasons for poultrymen to consider in the business of raising poultry.

In any business there is always a most efficient time for performing certain duties incident to that business. The postponement of these tasks when the time is ripe almost always causes the operator to pay a penalty in proportion to his negligence.

Pullets should be housed when they are ready to lay; not too long before production or too long afterwards.

When a definite task cut out for him and egg production sets the time for doing it. When approximately 100 eggs daily are produced on the range, the wise operator will select and house from 300 to 500 of the most advanced pullets.

It is foolish to think that all pullets will come into production at the same time. Exclusive of the tail-enders, any flock will develop into three groups.

Feeding Facts to Bear in Mind. Pullets just starting in to lay demand more feed.

As egg production increases and the weather grows colder, the pullets need more feed.

Pullets gain in weight more rapidly after they are housed. Laying pullets left on the range too long after they start to lay don't gain so fast and frequently lose weight.

Losses in Cannibalism. Pullets should not be housed on a hot day or when humidity is low.

COUNTIES DOING FINAL WORK ON WHEAT ACREAGE CONTRACT

With the September 25 deadline for filing wheat contract applications past, the big job of county wheat allotment committees is getting under way.

Between now and December 1, all of the work of correcting the applications, publishing each grower's acreage and production figures, making the necessary adjustments so that county allotments will agree with official wheat production statistics, publishing the grower allotments and maximum acreage figures, preparing the contracts and getting them signed, and properly preparing all of them for sending in to the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, must be done.

Not until after the contracts from a county have all been sent to the Wheat Adjustment Administration and checked over there, can any grower in a county receive his benefit payments. The wheat growers of Oregon will be entitled to approximately three million dollars on the 1933 crop, two-thirds of it this fall.

One cause of delay in some counties is that many applications have not been made out correctly. Some growers did not understand that they are entitled to include as land seeded to wheat, wheat acreage which could not be re-seeded because of weather conditions, or which was prepared in the manner customary but could not be seeded because of unfavorable weather conditions.

Other growers failed to understand that volunteer wheat harvested for grain, wheat cut ripe and fed without threshing, and wheat allowed to ripen and hogged or pastured off, should be counted, as well as wheat cut when ripe and threshed. Some growers put in only the acreage actually harvested and threshed in figuring their acreage and production.

Some growers, on the other hand, included wheat planted and cut for hay or pasture. Such wheat cannot be included. However, acres of wheat proven to have been seeded with the intention of cutting for grain but which through necessity or some unforeseen situation were cut for hay or pastured off, may be included in the average acreage seeded.

There is much evidence to prove that flocks needlessly wormed do not lay as well as untreated flocks. If the flock is really emaciated pale shanked, rough featured and the flock shows definite presence of worms in large numbers per fowl, then of course, they should be given a remedy for the particular worm with which they are infested.

A flock of pullets that is smooth featured, yellow shanked, bright eyed, smooth red combs and in good flesh doesn't need a shot of worm medicine any more than its owner needs a shot of poison for a couple of bunions that he doesn't have.
