Why A Representative?

The people of the Pacific Northwest have been very fortunate in securing the \$31,000,000 allocation for a dam at Bonneville on the Columbia river, which is part of the huge public works program to furnish immediate employment for idle men.

Such developments would include the dam at Umatilla rapids. Perhaps there is as much chance as there has ever been for the building of a unit at Umatilla rapids making the river navigatable from the mouth of the Snake to tidewater.

Data on wheat tonnage in the Interior country, possible canalization of the river at Umatilla rapids, and other information has been assembled by E. P. Dodd of Hermiston executive secretary of the Tri-state Development League.

Portland papers are not satisfied with the allocation of money for the Bonneville dam but persist in their persecution of Congressman Walter M. Pierce who remained faithful to the Umatilla rapids project.

Are the people and their representatives in eastern Oregon required to sit idly by and let Portland and Multnomah county representatives dictate what they may or may not support?

One Sided.

In demanding more highway money for Multnomah county Portland leaders do not give adequate consideration to the situation throughout the state and to the very liberal allocation made to the Portland area.

50-50 between western Oregon and eastern Oregon, but the funds this year are allocated on a basis of 6 per cent to western Oregon and about 33 per cent to eastern Oregon.

In addition the state is getting \$5,000,000 for the coast bridges when this amount is considered it will be seen that western Oregon is getting a total of \$9,000,000 of highway funds and eastern Oregon but \$2,000,000 or thereabouts.

Western Oregon \$18,500,000 Eastern Oregon 2,000,000 Such allocation would be entirely out of line when recognition is given to the fact that 69 per cent of the area of the state is in eastern Oregon and nearly 60 per cent of the highway mileage.

Yet 18 counties, one-half the number of counties in the state, are in eastern Oregon and every county in the district has a serious unemployment situation to deal with.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"Unreality" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, October 1.

The Golden Text was, "The Lord bringeth the counsel of the heathen to naught: He maketh the devices of the people of none effect" (Ps. 33:10).
