Two additional Oregon counties are engaging county agricultural agents this year and one that dropped the work last year has restored the necessary funds to the budget.

PROJECT REFINANCE PLANS HELD UP BY UNPAID TAXES.

The problem of delinquent taxes on reclamation projects is one of the chief obstacles in the way of obtaining federal refinancing of district indebtedness, judging from discussion at the recent annual meeting of the Oregon Reclamation congress at Baker.

On this special committee are Senator Jay Upton, Bend; Donald Graham, Prineville; F. P. Ferrell, Medford; Albert B. Ridgway, Portland, and E. E. Wist, Scappoose. The executive committee of the Congress was authorized to build up a fund for use in following up the Oregon district applications for refinancing.

President Sawyer brought out in his annual address that this refinancing legislation and much of the program of the national reclamation association originated with the Oregon Congress. Dr. Powers, in the report of the secretary, proposed a new definition for reclamation to include "keeping in production or bringing into full production those lands that most deserve to be in production."

Klamath Falls was selected as the next meeting place. The president and secretary were reelected together with the following directors: E. H. Judd, Medford; M. R. Lewis, Corvallis, and George Kanoff, Bend.

"AGRICULTURAL WORKERS" DEFINED BY NRA RULING.

The definite ruling of NRA exempting agricultural workers from the requirements of the labor provisions of blanket and specific industrial recovery codes, has been received at Oregon State college by George O. Gatlin, extension economist in marketing, who recently returned from Washington, D. C., where he went as the representative of many northwest agricultural interests.

Following is the definition now accepted for agricultural workers: "Agricultural workers are all those employed by farmers on the farm when they are engaged in growing and preparing for sale the products of the soil and, or live-stock; also, all labor used in growing and preparing perishable agricultural commodities for market in original perishable form. When workers are employed in processing farm products or preparing them for market, beyond the stage customarily performed within the area of production, such workers are not to be deemed agricultural workers."

This subject of exempting agricultural workers from the labor agreements under NRA was an important storm center for many weeks in Washington. Gatlin reports, during which time representatives of agricultural industries pointed out the necessity of such an exemption, particularly in view of the lag in farm prices in the general upswing of commodity levels. Expenses of Mr. Gatlin's trip east were met by cooperative marketing and similar organizations of the northwest needing personal representation during the period of rapid developments pertaining to agriculture. He attended hearings, obtained interpretations, worked on agreements and codes, supplied documents, handled loan matters and otherwise kept in touch with developments of vital interest to Oregon and Pacific northwest agriculture.
