TAKE SOUNDINGS OF COLUMBIA RIVER.

Spokane, Wash.—Soundings of the Columbia River are being taken to determine the exact contour of the river bottom, according to F. A. Banks, federal engineer in charge of the Grand Coulee construction.

For this work, the engineers are using a 28-foot launch, which will also be used in surveying the banks of the river above the dam to determine what land will be overflowed.

A topographical survey of the engineers' campsite has been completed, and surveys will now be made for streets, and sewer and water systems.
