Political Measures.

Now that the brief setting forth facts in the improvement of the lower Snake river and middle Columbia river sectors for navigation and power development has been presented to Marshall N. Dana, regional public works director, by the tri-state committee, it is time for a definite campaign to be carried out.

At the present time the major question is a means of raising funds to finance a representative who will contact proper authority in northwestern Idaho, Lewiston, Spokane, Wenatchee, Yakima, Walla Walla, and a portion of Western Montana to line them up on a constructive

campaign. Umatilla county, with its millions of bushels of wheat to be shipped to tidewater each year, has pledged full support to any proposed program. The head of navigation on the Snake is at Lewiston which brings all territory tributary, under the benefits of development at mid-Columbia. But some of this vast wealth of information must be brought before groups in these sections, and it takes money to carry on such a campaign. It would be total waste to drop the project since it has been developed to the point of recognition.

The "Commonwealth, Inc. Business Survey" a private publication published in Portland says "Oregon is undeveloped because its resources are largely marginal, transportation to markets precludes profitable exploitation. One plan calls for canalization of Columbia and Snake, making navigation to Lewiston practicable." This statement leads to the belief that the Bonneville development on the Columbia does not complete the improvements necessary to the Pacific northwest.

It is said further that "four hundred and sixty shippers have promised 93,719 eastward tons annually, 286,136 westward. Counties contiguous to rivers ship 2,000,000 tons of agricultural products annually. Principal carlot shipments to them total 250,000 tons. Available westbound tonnage from river countries, 5,000,000 tons. Available plus potential tons 12,000,000. Then add the 55 billion tons of minerals and chemicals now underground whose development depends on cheap transportation." These figures show that the development at Bonneville is not sufficient to supply the needed cheap transportation because it will not canalize the Columbia to the mouth of the Snake. Then why give up the battle as useless?

The farmers and business men in the three states, and later in western Montana, can correct the situation if they will organize and work with determination. The unemployment situation would insure the support of labor in view of the jobs that would be created by upper river work.

Since this is the time for action, and since the matter is being handled on a political basis, rather than on a basis of economic need, political measures are necessary. It should be made clear to men like Senator McNary that there are votes in eastern Oregon as well as elsewhere, and that while he was speaking for the lower Columbia river development the interests of the producer were being ignored. Not even secondary consideration was given.

Attempts to reduce freight rates by dealing with commissions has gotten the producer nowhere—they regulate the public for the benefit of the railroads.
