NOTICE TO MEMBERS EASTERN OREGON TURKEY GROWERS ASSOCIATION.

The Eastern Oregon Turkey Growers association will ship turkeys on November 8, and again on November 22, each pool to be separate.

The secretary is mailing out cards to all members, and everyone is earnestly requested to fill in the blanks on receipt of the card, and mail immediately, so that provision may be made for handling your birds.

After receiving your card telling how many turkeys you intend to ship, you will be notified as to what time to bring your birds. You are asked to note particularly that if your card is not returned you will not receive the above notice, and no provision will be made for time to receive your birds.

Anyone wishing to ship before the first pool, may do so by making arrangements, and shipping to Portland by truck. Contact the secretary and he will help with the arrangements.

All turkeys shipped before November 30 will be in one pool. The shipment the 8th will comprise a second pool, and the one on the 22d, a third pool.

Remember, it never pays to kill birds that are not ready for market. By feeding an unfinished bird a little longer, you gain in weight as well as in grade.

EXPERIMENT STATION REPORTS PIG FEEDING TRIALS.

It has been a common practice among feeders of hogs to soak the grain, either whole or ground, before feeding. Recent experiments by the Oregon Experiment Station at Corvallis have shown this practice to be undesirable under certain conditions, according to information supplied by the Umatilla County Agent.

This experiment which dealt with barley and oats included trials of these feeds when fed whole dry, whole soaked, steam-rolled, finely ground, and coarsely ground. Oats were fed to growing pigs under 100 pounds live weight, while the barley experiments were with fattening pigs weighing about 100 pounds at the start, and about 180 pounds at the finish. The summary of the experiment shows that 100 pounds of whole oats soaked equal 99.62 pounds of whole dry oats, and that 100 pounds of coarsely ground oats equal 103.62 pounds of whole dry oats. When 100 pounds of oats were finely ground, they were found to be equal to 112.7 pounds of whole dry oats, and 100 pounds of steam-rolled oats equal 97.58 pounds of whole dry oats.

In the barley experiments, 100 pounds of this grain whole soaked had the same feeding value as 90.12 pounds of whole dry barley, but when 100 pounds of barley was coarsely ground, it had a feeding value equal to 109.6 pounds of whole dry barley.

Finely ground whole barley in the amount of 100 pounds was found by these experiments to be equal to 113.1 pounds of whole dry barley, and the test showed that 100 pounds of steam-rolled barley was the equivalent of 116.5 pounds of whole dry barley.

The results of these experiments show that there was little or no advantage gained in soaking whole oats for growing pigs, but that there was an advantage in grinding. Coarse grinding decreased the amount of feed per 100 pounds of gain by 3.6 per cent, and fine grinding decreased it by 12.7 per cent. The increase in daily gain for the finely ground oats lot was considerably greater than that for coarsely ground oats, with the results showing that fine grinding was therefore far superior to coarse grinding as a preparation of oats for growing pigs. Coarse grinding did not pay the cost of grinding.

The report of the experiments says that it does not seem advisable to steam-roll oats for growing pigs due to the extra cost of the steam-rolling, which leads to the conclusion that finely ground oats are the most economical.

In the barley experiments, the soaking actually lowered its feeding value. Grinding improved the feeding value of barley more than it did that of oats, but the above summary will show that fine grinding improved the feeding value more greatly than did any other process except steam-rolling, which again does not lend itself to ordinary farm practice due to the fact that the equipment for steam-rolling is too expensive for farm use. The report states that burr-mills are not as suitable for fine grinding as are the hammer-mills. Most hammer-mills will grind grain finely when a screen of 1-8 inch holes is used.

Chinese Wheat Orders Expected.

Spokane, Wash.—An order for from 2,000,000 to 5,000,000 bushels of wheat, to start the export of the Pacific northwest's 35,000,000 bushels surplus, is expected during the next week from the Chinese government, it is reported here.

This report follows the arrival in Portland from Washington, D. C., of J. J. Lavin, wheat buying agent for the Chinese. Coast observers are said to be convinced that Mr. Lavin has come to buy following urgent conferences with him on the part of officials of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration and the Reconstruction Finance corporation.
